## From the Pastor

# Pentecost Blessings! What does our Church Do for the Community Everyday?

'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. (Acts 2: 17)

God promises that we have the Holy Spirit supporting us to see visions and dream dreams for the whole church community. What visions and dreams do you have for the Church of the Roses' future?

Our session meeting last Tuesday took time to discuss strategy and envisioning for the future of the PCOR. We are discussing how to enhance our hospitality for all by upgrading our carpet, paint, and bathrooms. Visitors and long term members should feel a sense of safety, cleanliness, and care when they walk through our doors.

However, it takes more **money** to do these things that are urgent. So please consider how increasing your contributions to the PCOR will help our dreams and visions for the future of our church become a reality. We trust the Holy Spirit is helping us grow into a blessed future. We have been blessed with a long history of faithful members who have kept us going for over 62 years so far! Thank you for what you do every day in the way of volunteering and contributing to our financial stability.

Our church is so important to all of Santa Rosa and beyond! Below is a list of <u>some</u> of the daily activities we do as outreach to the community to show God's love in action for others and to sustain our members. Here is a daily summary of how your contributions are utilized to benefit not only our church but the whole SR community.

Sundays: Two worship services (Korean 9am and Presbyterian 10am). Sunday school for children up to age 12 is provided during church. An adult forum on relevant topics such as: "End of Life Decision-making" are often presented by groups like our Health Ministry after the service. Fellowship hour after worship in Bowen Hall gives us a chance to talk with new visitors and re-connect with friends. First Sunday of the month a contemplative worship service called Sacred Space will be held in Bowen Hall at 6:30pm. A free concert is also provided 5 x/year at 2pm. Service and Learning teams gather donations and organize. The pastor often does hospital and home visits.

Mondays: We provide a free high school breakfast daily. A senior exercise class meets for chair exercises. Free healthy snacks are delivered across the street (to feed the Boys and Girls club kids for all week), and we provide the meeting space for Boy Scout Troop 135. Stephen Ministers often meet to discuss how their care-giving is progressing and for continued education. A one week VBS happens every summer.

Tuesdays: Healthy food bags with enough food for a family of 4 for a month are given out from the front office daily. The Buildings and Grounds committee saves our church about \$60,000 a year in free repairs and maintains our whole facility and community garden so the breakfast can be served and other community organizations can utilize our building. We provide a meeting space for the Presbyterian Women group and other outside the church organizations. Our Session meets to oversee the church governance, discuss use of mission funds, and share committee reports. The Deacons also meet on this day once a month to discuss their mission program and congregational care. The sewing group makes quilts for hospitals twice a month. Many session committees meet to plan their activities that include outreach and nurturing to the community in our region and beyond. The

Board of Elections uses our church for voting.

Wednesdays: Our staff meets every Wed. morning to coordinate our work together. People drop in about 3x a week for free counseling/consult with the Pastor in the afternoon. Rosebud Preschool provides excellent teaching and care of 45 children daily. The community is invited to a free study and discussion on relevant social justice topics or a Bible Study on Wed. evenings. The pastor often does hospital and home visits to the homebound.

Thursdays: The widow support group meets for lunch and discussion. The front office is still open daily to hand out free food bags. The Bell Choir and Chancel choir practice from 6-9pm. A new Girl Scout Troop will be meeting here in the future. A book club meets monthly. Our free film series shows movies on theological and relevant themes followed by a discussion.

Fridays: A Noon Hour of Prayer and Contemplation is conducted. Free breakfast and food bags are handed out daily. Many people stop by the front office asking about using our facility or for help with resources. We provide Friday Vespers services during Advent and Lent. Parents Night Out are provided occasionally to give preschool parents a free childcare night out.

Saturdays: Memorial services and weddings are often conducted. Our Voyagers group, the Spring Fling, Interfaith Council and other groups hold special events.

Community organizations such as NAMI, PEO, Narcotics Anonymous, University Women and other churches use our hall, too. Our church staff and volunteers do all the above nearly every week of the year. It is a mutual blessing for all involved!

The Church of the Roses is alive and well in the grace of the Holy Spirit! We are so thankful for YOU and how you bless us so that we can bless Santa Rosa! Happy Summer 2017!

# Committee Updates

#### **WORSHIP**

#### What is Pentecost?

The Worship Committee is focused on Pentecost. I did some reading to be more certain that I understood the word, the event, and the lasting meaning of Pentecost for us. I felt the following article was useful in explaining the message we will hear on Pentecost, June 4<sup>th</sup>. [Kay Young, chair of Worship]

Pentecost Sunday is a commemoration and celebration of the receiving of the Holy Spirit by the early church. John the Baptist prophesied of the first Pentecost when Jesus would baptize with the Holy Spirit and with fire (Matthew 3:11). Jesus confirmed this prophecy with the promise of the Holy Spirit to the disciples in John 14:26. He showed Himself to his followers after His death on the cross and His resurrection, giving convincing proofs that He was alive. Jesus told the disciples to wait in Jerusalem for the Father's gift of the Holy Spirit, from whom they would receive power to be His witnesses to the ends of the earth (Acts 1:3-8). After Jesus' ascension to heaven, they returned to Jerusalem and joined together in prayer in an upper room. On the Day of Pentecost, just as promised, the sound of a violent wind filled the house and tongues of fire came to rest on each of them and all were filled with the Holy Spirit. They were given the power of communication, which Peter used to begin the ministry for which Jesus had prepared him. After the coming of the Holy Spirit, the disciples did not stay in the room basking in God's glory, but burst out to tell the world. This was the beginning of the church as we know it.

Today, in many Christian churches, Pentecost Sunday is celebrated to recognize the gift of the Holy Spirit, realizing that God's very life, breath and energy live in believers. During this service, John 20:19-23 may be the core of the message about our risen Savior supernaturally appearing to the fear-laden disciples. Their fear gave way to joy when the Lord showed them His hands and side. He assured them peace and repeated the command given in Matthew 28:19-20, saying, "As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." Then He breathed on them, and they received the Holy Spirit (John 20:21-23).

The celebration of Pentecost Sunday reminds us of the reality that we all have the unifying Spirit that was poured out upon the first-century church in Acts 2:1-4. It is a reminder that we are co-heirs with Christ, to suffer with Him that we may also be glorified with Him; that the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good (1 Corinthians 12:7); that we are all baptized by one Spirit into one body (1 Corinthians 12:13); and that the Spirit which raised Jesus from the dead lives inside believers (Romans 8:9-11). This gift of the Holy Spirit that was promised and given to all believers on the first Pentecost is promised for you and your children and for all who are far off whom the Lord our God will call (Acts 2:39).

#### **DEACONS**

It's not too early to start thinking about Christmas if you are a Deacon. We are currently screening proposed projects for the Giving Tree 2017. Member Dana Thomas was our guest in April to promote support for Veterans, one of our projects last year.

We plan to make our decision at the June meeting. We'll keep you posted on the results. We take a break during July and August. In September we are planning our first Deacon Buddy Day to coincide with Kick Off Sunday this fall. Our objective for members to meet their Deacon buddy over coffee in Fellowship Hall and hopefully get to know some other members of the congregation.

An on-going project for Deacons is the Food Shelf which provides a grocery bag of non-perishable items once a month to families that request help. The encouraging news is that our numbers are down from last year, hopefully a sign of an improving economy - 24 food bags were given out in February, 17 in March, and 19 in April.

#### **MUSIC DIRECTOR**

Join us for a HYMN SING on Father's Day, June 18th. Start thinking of 2-3 favorite hymns from the small blue hymnal or the purple hymnal. We will be running a survey in the bulletin. Our last choir practice before summer break is June 29th.

#### **FINANCE**

Thru the first 4 months of 2017 expenses are in line with budget but revenues (member pledges and non-pledge collections) are behind budget. Please be certain to keep up with your pledge (promised giving) as this is the principle source of income to cover our operating expenses. We don't have many options if revenues don't cover expenses. Historically we relied upon ample reserves to cover the deficits, but we can't continue to do this!

Together with the Building & Grounds Committee, we are developing a capital projects list and estimated timing of the likely expenditures. It is our responsibility to adequately maintain our building and equipment and with no capital reserves and no intent on borrowing anymore until our existing mortgage is repaid, we anticipate the need for a capital campaign. I also ask that you give strong consideration to naming Church of the Roses as beneficiary of a bequest in your estate planning.


Our church needs to build a capital reserve account to fund the capital projects that are "maintenance projects". Let me give you an example by sharing with you the age of parts of our facility: sanctuary roof 25 years old, exterior paint 25 years old, sanctuary furnace 40 years old, interior paint 25 years old, carpet Sanctuary/ Campbell Court 25 years old. Plus, with heavy usage of our kitchen with the 15 year old Montgomery High School breakfast program, some kitchen equipment is nearing or has surpassed its "useful life". To put that into perspective a new commercial dishwasher is about \$9,000.

As always, I welcome any questions about our church finances.

#### **STAND UP TO FALLS**

June is National Safety Month! One in three older Americans falls every year. Falls are the leading cause of both fatal and nonfatal injuries for people aged 65+. Home is usually the place where we feel most safe, so it may be a surprise to hear that falls in the home are one of the leading causes of injury-related death in the U.S., second only to poisoning. Falls are the most common cause of traumatic brain injuries, including concussions.

The good news about falls is that most of them can be prevented. Common factors that can lead to falls are issues with balance and gait, poor vision, certain medications, chronic conditions such as arthritis, neuropathies or stroke, and the actual home environment. Eliminate tripping hazards by removing the sources of tripping. Examples include:

- Secure electrical and phone cords away from walking areas, such as hallways or in front of your desk
- Use non-skid rugs and be sure to tape them down to prevent rolling
- Keep drawers and cabinets closed when you're not using them
- Wear proper footwear!
- Clean up spills immediately
- Refrain from walking while distracted stay focused on your surroundings
- Ensure there is adequate lighting
- Don't carry more than you can handle—large loads can obstruct your vision and affect your balance
- Clean up home clutter
  If you feel unsteady, use an assistive device such as
  a cane or walker, raised toilet seat or grab bars

#### Preventing falls in your bathroom

Falls can happen anywhere, but in your home, the bathroom is one of the most dangerous places. According to the CDC, about 235,000 people over age 15 visit the emergency room each year due to a bathroom related-injury. Older adults are especially susceptible. According to the National Institute on

Aging, 80 percent of senior falls happen in the bathroom due to slippery floors and surfaces. Ways to keep safe in the bathroom include:

- Place a non-slip mat both inside and outside of the tub
- Plug in nightlights in and around the bathroom for increased visibility
- Clean up any condensation or puddles on the floor
- Place nonslip decals on the bottom of your shower or tub
- Keep shampoo, soap and other bath products higher up to avoid bending
- Install grab bars by the toilet and in or near the shower and tub to assist older adults
- Make sure the bathroom door swings outward in case of a fall

Make your home safer by starting at the source! Remove trip hazards around your home and ensure your bathroom is slip-free to eliminate the risk of falling.

# OTHER CONSIDERATIONS FOR FALL PREVENTION:

- Reduce your chances of falling by getting your vision checked regularly.
- If you take any medication, discuss common side effects such as dizziness and drowsiness with your doctor.
- Exercise regularly to maintain muscle strength and agility
- Consider Yoga for flexibility and strengthening
- If you need help, ask your Health Care Provider for a referral to an Occupational Therapist to maximize your safety and functional independence.
- A small investment in fall prevention is an investment in your independence. If you live alone, invest in a button activated Life Alert system to utilize in the event of a fall or other emergency!

- Do you ever wonder if some of them could be streamlined?
- Could you be taking a potentially inappropriate medication



Deborah will conduct comprehensive medication reviews during the Health Ministry Blood Pressure Screening clinic after worship on the 4<sup>th</sup> Sundays. If you would like a medication review, please bring your current prescription medication bottles, including eye drops, supplements, herbals and other over-the-counter medications in a brown paper bag to the Church library. She will help you understand your medications and provide you with a list of ideas and recommendations based on best practices for older adult prescribing to take to your healthcare provider for discussion.




