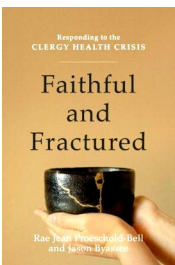

HAPPENING AT CHURCH OF THE ROSES

Here is a report of the Presbytery of the Redwoods meeting held at our Church of the Roses on May 18th, 10am-3pm: About 85 people attended the quarterly meeting of the Presbytery of the Redwoods. Many commented about how beautifully our new carpet accented our hallways! They were glad to see our new bathroom renovations were progressing well, too.

One pastor said she could feel the Holy Spirit in this place and was so impressed with all the missions and programs we are engaged in! We started the meeting with a worship service led by me, Chris Rhodes, and Linda Burille. Bill Morgan and his Four for His Glory quartet graced the service with a beautiful song: "Restore My Soul." Barbara McElroy played the piano and we sung hymns about restoration and the Holy Spirit.



I preached a sermon on Romans 8:22-27 titled: "Faithful and Broken" about the need for the Holy Spirit to restore and revitalize us all. I mentioned that clergy and other church leaders are often not taking good care of our bodies, minds, and spirits. I referenced this book in the sermon and afterwards many of the pastors said they wanted to read it:

FINANCE

Through our first 4 months of the year things out of finance are good. Revenues are ahead of budget and expenses just a bit above budget. Expense increases were self-inflicted as we decided to extend more working hours to Jami and Ruth in the office. Cash operating reserves remain very adequate. But, with no capital reserves (money held in reserve for needed capital items, e.g. carpeting, renovated bathrooms, etc.) we need small capital campaigns to be successful in order to afford the work.

Our existing capital campaign has been successful but with just a little more we'll be able to carpet the offices and replace the rain gutters that leak and are totally ineffective.

Please ask Dan Bargar about a very effective way to donate to the church if you have and are using distributions from an IRA as support. With the recent tax law changes wherein the standard deduction has been raised appreciably, donations to the church might not have the same favorable impact to your taxes. So using a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) from your IRA is a distribution not taxed as income! Look into it, it's a great way to make your donations.

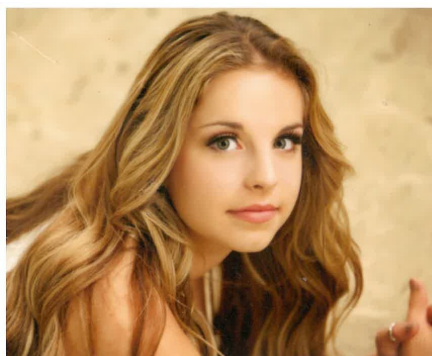

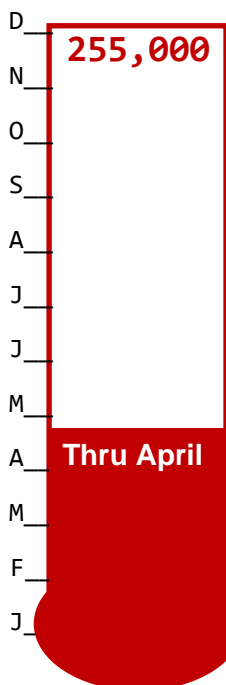

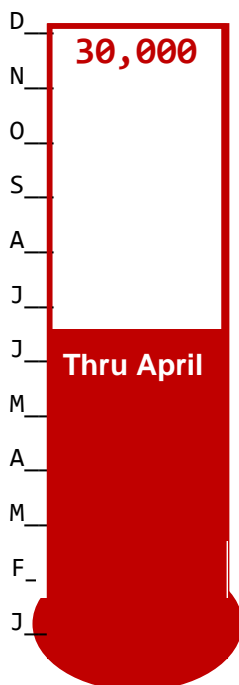

Casey Crouch, grandson of Alice Crouch is graduating from Arroyo Grande High School and is headed for UCLA.



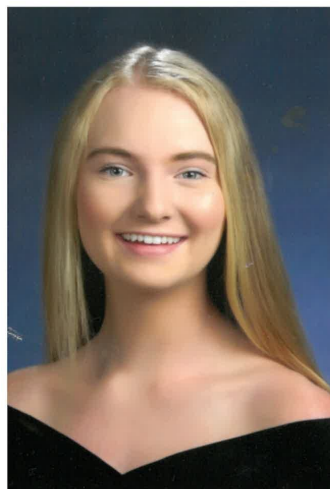
Sofia Da Silva, granddaughter of Don and Mickey Marshall, is graduating from Deer Valley H.S. in Antioch, CA.

A Patient-Centered Health Care System

What do you want your healthcare to look like? Do you feel included in your healthcare decisions? As consumers and patients, we are the center of our healthcare team, and we matter! It's important to find a healthcare provider (HCP) that satisfies your unique healthcare needs (physical, emotional, mental, spiritual).

Who are the members of the healthcare team? - patients (and their advocates), HCPs (physicians, nurses, nurse practitioners, physician assistants), physical therapists, respiratory therapists, pharmacists, dietitians, health educators, emergency technicians, etc.

The type of healthcare you receive is largely dependent on the role that we (patients) assume. Historically, healthcare has been doctor or HCP - centered, in which the HCP is the center around which everything revolves. In this case, the HCP is the center of knowledge, decision-making, and the gate-keeping, while patients usually assume passive or dependent positions, following HCP directions without much questioning. The HCP has the majority of power, and there is not much space for dialogue, asking questions or having access to other options for care. In the long run, this system is not sustainable or beneficial for either HCP or patients, as it results in a static, inflexible, and fixed healthcare system, where both parties feel "used," disconnected, powerless and stuck.

Over the last 50 years, there has been a growing movement toward a patient-centered healthcare, in which patients' needs are central. Patients must assume an active and participative role in their own healthcare team. It provides optimal,

wholistic and personal care, including preventive care and lifestyle changes. Active patient participation entails being involved in active and wise decision-making about your healthcare; expressing opinions about different treatment methods and sharing important information, and practicing personal empowerment by taking responsibility for your own health. You must have access to and keep records of your medical history (illnesses and conditions, allergies and sensitivities) and treatment (including medication and dietary supplements, immunizations, past hospitalizations, other HCPs treating you, test results, treatment options, etc). Very specifically, you must know what medications you are taking and why you are taking them. You should always have a list of your medications, allergies, conditions, treatments, and other providers with you for all HCP visits.

To make informed decisions about your healthcare, you must have accurate information about your treatment options, and HCP's abilities and limitations. You must learn as much as you can about your needs, and treatment options. You are entitled to use any of the following methods - ask questions, dialogue, pamphlets, books, internet, health educators, second opinions, etc. You may need to learn new communication skills to actively participate in your healthcare team, as well as respect, responsibility, self-knowledge, and honestly sharing information (lifestyle, feelings, thoughts). You may need to have a healthcare advocate, if you don't feel you can assume such active role or if you are too ill.

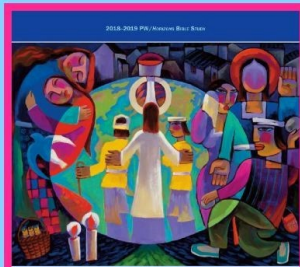

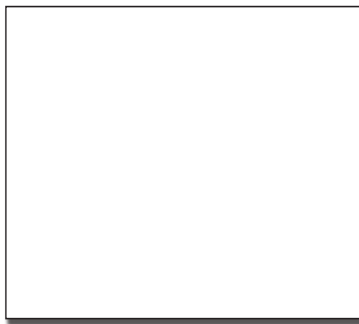


