## From the Pastor

# OUR MINISTRY TO CHILDREN

"And they were bringing children to Him so that He might touch them; but the disciples rebuked them. But when Jesus saw this, He was indignant and said to them, "Permit the children to come to Me; do not hinder them; for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these. "Truly I say to you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God like a child will not enter it at all." (Mark 12: 13-16)

It is a true blessing when our church has Keyaun, Kairo, Mia, and Elijah, participating in worship with us! We are also blessed when little Jacob, and your various grandchildren attend our church, too. However, church attendance over the whole US is not only in a decline for adults, but many churches no longer have youth programs. Those who hold on to youth programs or find ways to creatively serve the youth of their community keep the church vital, according to recent studies on church growth. Jesus does not want us to give up when parents with children are not bringing them to church. We must seek other ways to engage and share God's love with them beyond worship.

So how do we respond to the national decline of church attendance and the decline of children in worship, too? Many churches are focusing on offering other ways to minister to youth. Here are the ways your Church of the Roses ministers to children as Jesus would want us to:

We just completed Vacation Bible School where the 29 children who happily attended for a week of PEACE LAB were either from: our own neighborhood, our own preschool, or children whose parents had heard about it from our Deacon food bag program where we drop fliers in the bags of food given out.

The snack program for the Boys and Girls club across the street reaches out to children in need of healthy snacks.

Our free breakfast program during the school

year feeds about 100 hungry high school students a hot breakfast each day. We are now celebrating birthdays among the breakfast youth group to help them feel even more comfortable relating to us.

Our Boy, Girl, and Cub Scouts enjoy the use of our church facility weekly. We partnered with the Girl Scouts to create blessing bags. Some of our Boy Scouts worked and ate with us at the church picnic last weekend.

Our Rosebud preschool offers 2-4 year old neighborhood kids a safe place to attend during the week. It has an excellent reputation! Our Parent's night Out (that our Christian Ed. Committee developed) is becoming popular with our preschool parents.

Since sports practices conflict with church attendance often on Sunday mornings, our church is providing an alternative time when parents and kids could attend together. The Saturday night Sacred Space worship services are especially designed so children could attend and enjoy the activities, too.

Replacing the carpet and fixing up the bathrooms presents a cleaner image and provides a much more hospitable environment for kids and their parents.

The above actions connect our church to Santa Rosa's youth in nurturing ways.

To serve the community utilizing my background in mental health, and to connect to programs that promote healthy children, I have recently agreed to be on the steering committee for the Child Parent Institute here in Santa Rosa. The Child Parent Institute is a parent education and children's mental health agency serving families throughout Sonoma County since 1978. They provide child therapy, family resource assistance, parent education, facilitated supervised visitation, therapeutic and recreational creative arts programming, and a non-public school (New Directions) providing adolescent

special education/mental health services. The Child-Parent Institute also advocates for policies that support families and protect children.

The Child Parent Institute is a member of the coalition for Child Abuse Prevention in the Greater Bay Area. Concerning the current administration's actions on the Mexico border that resulted in the separation of over 2000 immigrating children from their parents, the Coalition wrote this response with which I heartily agree:

# IT IS CHILD ABUSE, NOT IMMIGRATION POLICY

The systemic separation of children from their families is government sanctioned child abuse. As we first learned about the immigration policy being enacted on our southern border, we were concerned. Because we can no longer stand by, we must add our voices to the doctors, clergy, parents, and Americans who are outraged at these actions.

On June 18<sup>th</sup> the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) announced their opposition to the Border Security and Immigration Reform Act announced by the U.S. House of Representatives leadership. The AAP has affirmed that separating families at the border is a form of child abuse.

The actions being taken today will produce real and lasting harm to these children. It has both life-long physical and developmental impacts. This kind of stress, particularly in small children, can "disrupt the neurological connections that are part of the developing brain" -- Dr. Colleen Kraft of the AAP.

Whether or not the separation policy is moral or immoral, legal or illegal, it is harming these children. The problem we are facing here is not an immigration policy or a biblical validation for the actions. The problem is child abuse. Every child deserves the comfort and security of their parents. Children should be able to rely on their parents' nurturing protection. We urge anyone concerned about the impact of separation on children and families to go to the National Child Traumatic Stress Network to learn more:

While we are encouraged by the executive order halting family separations for the time being, we add our voices to the collective concern for the approximately 2,300 children who have yet to be reunited with their parents. We also urge Congress and the Administration to work together to end family separation immediately and permanently as a part of immigration policy. (Bay Area Child Abuse Prevention Council Coalition)

Please pray for the good work of the Child-Parent Institute here in Santa Rosa, and for the children and parents separated so cruelly by our government. May they find healing and wholeness and be reunited as soon as possible! The kingdom of God belongs to them as well as to us who are responsible for: "...providing justice, loving kindness, and walking humbly with God." (Micah 6:8)

The Church of the Roses Session approved adding our church's name along with the signatures from the San Anselmo church Session to the following letter that has been endorsed by our Presbytery of the Redwoods for all the churches to consider signing:

In response to the humanitarian crisis at our nation's southern border, the Session of First Presbyterian Church of San Anselmo issues the following statement:

Recently, the Administration began separating families and criminally prosecuting all people who enter the U.S. without previous authorization, removing children, including many as young as 2 or 3 years old, to detention facilities away from their parents. We vehemently condemn this cruel practice as an outrage and a travesty.


We affirm the family as a foundational societal structure to support human community. The security of the family provides critical mental, physical and emotional support to the development and well being of children. Leaving their communities is often the only option migrants have to provide safety for their children and protect them from harm. Tearing children away from parents who have made a dangerous journey to provide a safe and sufficient life for them is unnecessarily cruel and detrimental to the well being of parents and children. The harm done to these children is permanent and has a lifetime of health consequences.

We further condemn the use of cruelty as a potential bargaining chip to achieve increasingly draconian immigration policies.

Finally, we condemn the misappropriation of scripture to justify this loveless action. It is disgraceful for a government official to use scripture in order to say, "obey me." If this situation is to be approached from a Christian perspective, or relying on Christian teachings, the Bible honors the stories of migrants looking for new homes, and condemns ripping children out of the hands of their parents. To argue otherwise is to misrepresent the full text of scripture to justify the cruelty imposed upon children of asylum-seeking women and men. They, like the Holy family of Matthew 2, flee oppression. And it is in their favor that the Christian scriptures speak, not the government's. These families are the very neighbors Jesus commands us to love. In fact, Jesus says that there is nothing more imperative than loving. Separating children from parents is not loving in any way, but instead, is an evil practice which must end with all families reunited, safe and free.



## **ESSENCE OF THE ROSE HEALTH MINISTRY**

## A Patient-Centered Health Care System—Part 2 by Felipa Jones

What is a healthcare advocate? A healthcare advocate is anyone who will support, believe, sponsor, promote, campaign, back you up or be your spokesperson when you need them to do so. She/he should be a person in whom you trust, and who is willing to act on your behalf, and can work all with other members of the healthcare team; e.g., a family member, a friend, or a professional advocate. Professional advocates are available through hospitals, many institutions, and are called Patient Representatives or Patient Advocates; they can be nurses, social workers, or chaplains.

#### Benefits of a patient-centered healthcare approach:

- Improved health outcomes, enhanced quality of life (QOL), and cost-effective services
- Better management of chronic conditions, adoption of healthier lifestyles, better access to care, improved quality of care, and greater efficiency for all
- Improved patient satisfaction with their care
- Better understanding of the patient's goals and desires by the healthcare team
- Better understanding of the illness or condition by the patient, including risks and benefits of different treatment options
- Better decision-making for both patients and healthcare providers as they both work together to address the issue
- Improved well-being and healthcare, including better coordination of care with other HCPs
- Healthcare providers develop a personal, unique partnership with patients, treating them holistically and looking the the bigger picture.
- Personal and community empowerment, where patients and the community are engaged, active, and validated as members of the healthcare team.

# Possible disadvantages of a patient-centered healthcare approach:

- May feel less satisfied with their care and feel less trusting of their HCP, tending not to follow HCP orders. This occurs more in patients who prefer a more traditional "doctor-centered" style.
- A patient-centered model may not always the best most answer! E.g., with literacy or understanding disabilities, if life-saving efforts are urgent, or if there are failures or inadequate resources to support patient decision.

In summary, the right healthcare system is unique and individual, and may be a combination of HCP and patient -centered. The key to quality healthcare is finding a HCP that shares your goals and values - one that you will listen to and follow the treatment plan, one who matches your style and preferences.

Team members must develop a relationship based on dialogue, active listening, understanding, tolerance, respect and a sense of curiosity for each other's roles.

It can be a humbling experience to experience "the other side" at times, which leads to improved communication, as well as the development of courage, empathy and compassion. As a very kind Nurse's Aide from Portugal once mentioned, "I treat every patient as if they were my parents."

Remember, it's your health, and your thoughts, feelings, knowledge matter. You matter! Be prepared, and take responsibility for your own health.






