Soon we will be "launching" another church year. I am so grateful for all our church family members who are stepping up and participating in our committees making sure we are more than just a social club of like-minded individuals.

But what do you think? Is our church just a social club much like other social clubs?

Some people believe church is just a social club and so they choose to socialize elsewhere. Isn't there something missing in those groups that only a faithful church can fulfill?

STATEMENT FROM THE PCUSA GENERAL ASSEMBLY OFFICE CONCERNING THE EVENTS IN CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA

In the aftermath of the events of August 11 and 12 in Charlottesville, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) reaffirms its condemnation of white supremacy and racism, names them as sin, and renews its commitment to disrupting them and working for justice and equity.

We give thanks for the presence and faithful witness of church members who stand against white supremacy and racism. Individually and collectively the church, including Presbyterians, stood against hate in Charlottesville. Individually and collectively the church, including Presbyterians, works to disrupt racism and to build racial equity in places across the country. We grieve for Heather Heyer, who was killed while standing witness; we grieve for state police officers H. Jay Cullen and Berke Bates, who died in a helicopter crash while monitoring events in Charlottesville; we pray for the recovery of all who were injured.

We acknowledge that Scripture has been misused to justify white supremacy and racism. However, we proclaim that the Bible's message presents a far more consistent and insistent witness to God's love for diversity and justice. This may be observed in God's delight in the varied creation; heard in the words of prophets who reject oppression and commend justice as true worship; seen in the life and ministry of Jesus Christ, who values all persons regardless of any aspect of their identity; and experienced through the work of the Holy Spirit, who consistently blows through all the divisions we create, to reveal God's love for all humanity.

White supremacy and racism stand in stark, irreconcilable contradiction to God's intention for humanity. They reject part of the human family and are utterly contrary to God's Word made incarnate in Jesus. They are idolatries that elevate human -created hierarchies over God's freely given grace and love. They are lies about the human family, for they seek to say that some people are less than other people. They are lies about God because they falsely claim that God favors some people over the entirety of creation.

But as we give thanks, we acknowledge the church's complicity in the creation of white supremacy and racism. We confess the church's failure in challenging and disrupting white supremacy and racism. Too often we have accepted the status quo. Too often we have stood silent in the face of injustice and oppression.

By God's grace may we remember the events in Charlottesville; repent of our acquiescence and failures; and renew our commitment to proclaim and live the good news of Jesus Christ. May that commitment lead us to stand against, speak against and work against racism and white supremacy, this day and every day. May it be so. Amen.

LESSONS FROM THE FIELD: A NEW TYPE OF MISSIONS

I have lead many trips for churches over the years.

The largest trip I led, for a large and well funded church, had about 65 students and 20 adults. For some reason I thought it was a good idea to take this hoard of people to sleep in tents, without real showers or restrooms, to build houses in Mexico.

We built four houses in five days. Student's understanding of God expanded, people's lives were changed, and God's love was seen through everyone. It was awesome!

The planning that's involved takes months. Registration forms, organization paperwork, passports, liability forms, rental vans, drivers, adult support, fundraising, parent help, devotional books, scheduling, overnights while traveling—sunscreen! The list goes on and on and on.

SIDENOTE

I no longer use the language "missions trips." I choose to call these trips Serving and Learning Trips. Why? Because to use the language of "missions" has a lot of negative connotation surrounding the colonization of so many indigenous groups around the world.

It implies that the people on the team are going to save those other people. When in reality these trips are less about the destination, the activity, and more about the opportunity for those on the team to experience God's transforming power. Really, these trips are selfish.

By changing the name to Service and Learning, everyone is reminded that those on the trip are going to (1) *Serve*: partner with God in a place where God is already at work and (2) *Learn:* have the humble spirit of a student, ready to learn from God and those we meet along the way.

WHAT WE NEEDED

With my new position at a church, that is primarily an older demographic, I was asked to plan a trip to Mexico. With different demographics come different obstacles. I wanted to make sure that anyone, of any age, and any ability level could attend this trip. Which meant not using the organizations I have used in the past. Here's what I was looking for:

- Sleeping arrangements that allowed for those with older bodies to sleep well.
- Showers and running water.
- An organization where we didn't have to cook.

An organization that was not solely focused on building.

NEVER PLAN ALONE

I always plan these trips with at least two other people for a few reasons. One being that the more you bring others into a project, the more buy-in with the project they have, and therefore more excitement for the project stirs. Another, being that it's an opportunity to have other people in the congregation understand how to plan the project in the future. Last, being that it is not a good example of leadership to carry the entire burden of a project. It sets the leader up to be the center of the trip not Jesus.

So, I was on the hunt for a planning team! I asked the head elder at my church, who in the past had planned similar trips to what my experience was planning these trips. And the only 19 year old in my church, who had never been on any trip like this. We were a small but mighty!

LET THE PLANNING BEGIN & FINDING PEOPLE TO GO

I had my planning team now, we just needed a place to go and people to take with us. It took us about three weeks to find an organization that would support the needs of our community. After finding Door of Faith Orphanage, we just needed to recruit the rest of the team.

Having worked with students for so long I was not prepared for the inability of adults to make up their minds and to fully commit to the trip. We started with 15 people interested in going. I thought that was a great number. I could easily divide them up into groups of three for prayer and support during the trip. We would only need two cars. I can work with 15.

I had planned to have two meetings between three months of leaving for the trip. Within the time between the two meetings ten people dropped out and two people signed up. Seven...That's not even double digits?

WHERE TWO OR MORE ARE GATHERED

I really had to check myself. For years I have been telling people that it doesn't matter how many people show up... it's about being available for the people that God calls on the trip. Now I had a to own my words. I had to claim the fact that God wanted a specific group of people on this trip. I had to set my pride aside. God called seven specific people to this trip for seven specific reasons. I needed to honor those reasons. Seven it is!

WHERE DID YOU SEE JESUS TODAY?

Every night of the trip we would gather together to debrief the day. The question I always ask is "Where did you see Jesus today?" In the beginning of the week this portion of the trip was short. Maybe a one word answer from each person.

"This trip is about helping us train our eyes to see where God is already at work," I said, "It may take time but if we keep seeking to see Jesus at work then sooner or later we won't be able to stop seeing the way God sees."

There is a flow to a trip like this. I learned that the size of your group doesn't matter, the flow still happens. There is something about the Wednesday or the midpoint of a trip. Maybe its because your group has had enough time with each other to realize that everyone is safe or at least in the same place of learning. I'm not exactly sure why, but it is always at the mid-trip moment when breakthrough happens.

"I saw Jesus today in the way the community rallies together to support each other no matter what. I wish I had that in my life... just a little bit," our youngest participant says.

The entire group freezes.

We just got called out, by the only 16 year old in the room, to be vulnerable and real. The group has the choice to shut it down or embrace it. After a much longer silence than normal the oldest person in the group says, "Me too."

WHAT I LEARNED

From this we had the longest, most indepth evening debriefs I have ever been a part of. Community happened. People's hearts were softened. Worldviews were broadened. Lives will not be the same.

I am not sure exactly what the other six specifically learned from this trip, but I learned that God is faithful.

As a leader and pastor, I need to remember that God has

reasons that is outside my understanding for everything. Big isn't always better. Small is often more intimate and provides a fertile ground for growth. I need to trust, even though I don't know or understand the

Finance Update

I'm encouraged that for the month of July revenue was over budget and while YTD revenue still lags behind budget it is nicely up over same period from prior (2016) year.

A review of expenses suggest we continue to do a great job controlling our spending. Other than what we knew would be increases over prior year (Youth and Family Ministries director and Sunday school) the rest of expenses, excluding some timing differences, all appear in line.

Statements covering the first 6 mos of the year have been mailed. Maybe seeing (in your statement) that you were behind in your pledge payments created some catch up payments being made in July, which might explain why pledged income for the month of July was almost \$4,000 over budget for the month.

Operating cash reserves remain about \$120,000. Finance Committee didn't meet in August but will be focusing on this year's stewardship campaign as well fine tuning a potential capital drive for some facility upgrades (carpet and bathrooms). In addition, Linda Burille is looking into providing another forum on gifts and bequests.

MINDFULNESS MEDITATION IS GOOD FOR YOUR HEALTH

WHAT IS MINDFULNESS?

Joh Kabat-Zinn defines mindfulness as "paying attention in a particular way: on purpose, in the present moment, and nonjudgmentally". Wherever You Go There You Are: Mindfulness Mediation in Everyday Life, Hyperion: 1994.

Shamsh Alidina adds to the definition of mindfulness that certain qualities including "compassion, curiosity, and acceptance" are used when being mindful. Mindfulness teaches us the difference between living versus existing. *Mindfulness for Dummies*. John Wileny & Sons, Ltd. 2010

MINDFULNESS is by no means a new fad. Ancient cultures and religions worldwide have long drawn on various methods from meditation and prayer to Yoga and Tai-chi, to help individuals move toward wellbeing by focusing their attention and attuning to the present.

The first historical record of the use of music therapy in ancient literature can be found in the Bible. Samuel 16: 14-23: Whenever tormenting spirit from God come on King Saul, David would play the harp. Then Saul was refreshed and was well. This historian Josephus says, "at the same time sung hymns and psalms, made use of both vocal and instrumental music". David's Music Therapy.


MINDFULNESS AND SCIENCE

An eight-week study at University of Massachusetts Medical School Center for Mindfulness, 16 participants in the treatment group; 17 in the control group. The treatment consisted of a weekly 2.5-hour mindfulness meditation group meeting plus a daily audio recording of guided meditation to listen to at home. MRI images of the brains of both groups were taken before and after the study. RESULTS: Participants in the treatment group experienced improvements in the ability to focus

and concentrate, improved their skills of observing, and they were more capable at remaining nonjudgmental. The meditators (but not the control group) had increased concentrations of gray matter in several areas of the brain. The treatment group also experienced the added benefits of reduced stress levels.

SOME CREATIVE WAYS TO PRACTICE MINDFULNESS

Give yourself quiet time each day, connect with people, enjoy the beauty of nature, see the wonder of the present moment. Remember that thoughts aren't facts, be grateful every day, let go, breathe, and smile. David's Music Therapy helped King Saul lift his tormenting spirit of fear, paranoia, jealousy, and violent rage. Today, Music Therapy Teaching Mindfulness skills can help us foster an array of benefits from emotional balance and improved cardiac and immune function to an enhanced sense of empathy and self-understanding. Remember Taichi class is Saturdays at 10:30 AM and Music Memory Workshop (Learning to sing and play the ukulele) is Sundays at 9:00 AM.


