

FINANCE

Through July we are tracking just above budget and headed towards nice operating results for 2018 if this trend continues. I'm praying they do!!

There is a possibility that our insurance company may reimburse even more insurance claim dollars resulting from damages when our church was a temporary evacuation center after the fires. This would be a real surprise since we were initially of the impression the check we originally got would be the total claim. If more \$ comes our way this would truly be "pennies from heaven"!!!

I'll ask/plea again for everyone to be certain to make the "per capita" payment. This is a \$30.21/ member tax assessed to every church within PCUSA. We (PCOR) makes the payment which is approximately \$7400 for the year. Our hope is that our members reimburse the church. There is an envelope in your box labeled "per capita" or just use one of the generic envelopes in the pews and write "per capita" on the envelope. Thank you!

ESSENCE OF THE ROSE HEALTH MINISTRY

The Spirituality of the Labyrinth by Deborah Wolff-Baker

"A labyrinth is not a maze or a puzzle to be solved, but a path of meaning to be experienced. A labyrinth's path is circular and convoluted, but has no dead ends. A labyrinth has one entrance — one way in and one way out. While walking the path, one experiences both short and long curves to circle around. Sometimes the walk will take us out to the very edge, and sometimes the walk will take us to the center. We are never really lost, but we can never quite see where we are going". (Alex Pattakos, Ph.D.)

In the Middle Ages labyrinths were used to encourage people to participate in a pilgrimage without committing to the expense or time required by going to a far off place. Labyrinths were created on the floors of cathedrals to help draw people into meditation. One of the most famous of these Cathedral labyrinths can be found in the Chartres Cathedral in France.







Santa Rosa Labyrinth by Lea Goode- Harris

There are many different designs and methods for creating labyrinths but in common, they all point to the desire for mindfulness and a deeper connection and awareness of God. The Santa Rosa Labyrinth, created by Lea Goode-Harris who lives in Santa Rosa, is another example of a beautiful design that incorporates 7 circuits and a heart center. For those unable to take an ambulatory labyrinth walk, fingerboard labyrinths are also useful as a meditative and prayerful tool and can be purchased through specialty shops and on-line stores such as Amazon.com.

In many ways, the labyrinth can be looked at as a metaphor for life; a mirror to our journey. Sometimes we walk along the path easily, other times with difficulty. Sometimes we run and other times we may tiptoe forward with caution. We may jump for joy while walking through its elaborate turns and at other times we feel the need to stop, to reflect and to pray. As we walk, our path may be shared with others, or not. Whatever the condition, we are still on the labyrinth path that holds all our life experiences as sacred. The center is always there, even though our path may take us through countless twists and turns. Within the labyrinth, the burden of our life experiences may be carried and shed.

There is no *one* way to walk the labyrinth, and as in life itself, the journey allows for personal and spiritual transformation. Meditation or prayer at the center often asks for grace, forgiveness, and understanding. The outward walk from the center leaves us refreshed, revived, renewed and reminds us we are beloved children of God.

One method of labyrinth prayer includes:

- 1. As one moves toward the center of the labyrinth the person focuses on letting go of worldly attachments or coming to God with a question.
- 2. At the center, the person comes to the center of his or her relationship with God. One may linger in the center of the labyrinth, spending time reflecting on one's relationship with God and praying.
- 3. Eventually, the need returns to move out into the world again. As we walk back out, we are reminded we walk with God, and we return to our lives and places of service renewed.

Spend time in reflection following your pilgrimage or journey.

Another method of labyrinth prayer:

Walk into the center with worship and praise for God, then walk out with intercession and prayer for people and other concerns.

A Labyrinth Poem:

To be a pilgrim means to be on the move, slowly to notice your luggage becoming lighter to be seeking for treasures that do not rust to be comfortable with your heart's questions to be moving toward the holy ground of home with empty hands and bare feet. ~ Macrina Wiederkehr






