Scripture: Genesis 1:1-19

¹In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, ²the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. ³Then God said, "Let there be light"; and there was light. ⁴And God saw that the light was good; and God separated the light from the darkness. ⁵God called the light Day, and the darkness he called Night. And there was evening and there was morning, the first day.

⁶And God said, "Let there be a dome in the midst of the waters, and let it separate the waters from the waters." ⁷So God made the dome and separated the waters that were under the dome from the waters that were above the dome. And it was so. ⁸God called the dome Sky. And there was evening and there was morning, the second day.

⁹And God said, "Let the waters under the sky be gathered together into one place, and let the dry land appear." And it was so. ¹⁰God called the dry land Earth, and the waters that were gathered together he called Seas. And God saw that it was good. ¹¹Then God said, "Let the earth put forth vegetation: plants yielding seed, and fruit trees of every kind on earth that bear fruit with the seed in it." And it was so. ¹²The earth brought forth vegetation: plants yielding seed of every kind, and trees of every kind bearing fruit with the seed in it. And God saw that it was good. ¹³And there was evening and there was morning, the third day.

¹⁴And God said, "Let there be lights in the dome of the sky to separate the day from the night; and let them be for signs and for seasons and for days and years, ¹⁵and let them be lights in the dome of the sky to give light upon the earth." And it was so. ¹⁶God made the two great lights—the greater light to rule the day and the lesser light to rule the night—and the stars. ¹⁷God set them in the dome of the sky to give light upon

the earth, ¹⁸to rule over the day and over the night, and to separate the light from the darkness. And God saw that it was good. ¹⁹And there was evening and there was morning, the fourth day.

Genesis 1:20-31

Introduction: As you listen to the rest of this creation story, Please notice the image of God description in verses 26 and 27 where it reads: "Then God said, 'Let us make humankind in OUR image, according to OUR likeness...." and then it goes on to say:

So God created humankind in the image of God, MALE and FEMALE. Ancient scripture is inclusive.

The Presbyterian Church USA encourages the use of inclusive images of God in the reading of scripture and singing of hymns so that all of humankind is included in the faith as we were created to be.

Listen now:

²⁰And God said, "Let the waters bring forth swarms of living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the dome of the sky." ²¹So God created the great sea monsters and every living creature that moves, of every kind, with which the waters swarm, and every winged bird of every kind. And God saw that it was good. ²²God blessed them, saying, "Be fruitful and multiply and fill the waters in the seas, and let birds multiply on the earth." ²³And there was evening and there was morning, the fifth day.

²⁴And God said, "Let the earth bring forth living creatures of every kind: cattle and creeping things and wild animals of the earth of every kind." And it was so. ²⁵God made the wild animals of the earth of every kind, and the cattle of every kind, and everything that creeps upon the ground of every kind. And God saw that it was good.

²⁶Then God said, "Let us make humankind¹⁶ in our image, according to our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the wild animals of the earth, ¹⁶ and over every creeping thing that creeps upon the earth."

²⁷So God created humankind^[6] in his image, in the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.

²⁸God blessed them, and God said to them, "Be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth and subdue it; and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the air and over every living thing that moves upon the earth." ²⁹God said, "See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have them for food. ³⁰And to every beast of the earth, and to every bird of the air, and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food." And it was so. ³¹God saw everything that he had made, and indeed, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day.

This is the Word of the Lord! Thanks be to God!

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In honor of Mother's Day, I borrowed a story that was shared in the worship service at our last Presbytery meeting at the San Anselmo Presbyterian church. This is another imaginative perspective on the creation story that helps us remember that our Creator gave us a vital role as stewards of all creation. Noah seems to be looking up at Big Mama. And I'm sure she is currently not happy with us humans. We have been divinely ordained to be the stewards of the earth! Thanks to reckless greedy human behavior we are responsible for creating a path of extinction for 1 million species of animals and birds and insects. A recent global study reported by the United Nations found that

1 million species are on the path to extinction. The results of the study were explained this way: "the "unprecedented" decline in global biodiversity has alarming implications for human health, prosperity and long-term survival."

A report on NPR said: When a species dies out, we all lose something.

The importance of biodiversity can't be overestimated. Humble creatures (that we might not see as vital in our lives) are actually crucial to our existence. Honeybees are irreplaceable pollinators. Earthworms that aerate soil with oxygen are #2 on the endangered worms list. Frogs love to eat insects that would ravage plants if left unchecked. A recent study by Yale reports that amphibians are declining worldwide at an alarming rate.

Without keeping a balance in nature, even the tiniest ant can become a destructive monster colony. When the sparrows, wrens and starlings are gone, ants will flourish even more than they do now.

Our polluting behavior is "eroding the very foundations of economies, livelihoods, food security, health and the quality of all life worldwide." (NHPR: https://www.nhpr.org/post/1-million-animal-and-plant-species-are-risk-extinction-un-report-says#stream/0)

For example, I love penguins! 10 out of 18 species of penguins are on the path to extinction. My grandson will never forgive me if we lose penguins!

We all know polar bears are deeply suffering due to the disappearing sea ice. Siberian and South China tigers are critically endangered due to habitat loss from logging and over development.

The National Wildlife Federation's CEO, Collin O'Mara warns that the U.S. also has much to lose — especially if biodiversity is viewed as someone else's problem. "About one-third of all species right now in the U.S. are at heightened risk of potential extinction in the next couple of decades." But O'Mara also adds: "it is not too late to act."
