Thanksgiving is more than a Turkey Dayl

I am thankful for Thanksgiving. It is a holiday with a focus on gratefulness and gathering, not on materialism and getting the perfect gift. Sadly, in the U.S., our original Christmas focus on celebrating the Christ child has been taken over by the shopping industry. So Thanksgiving is now my favorite holiday. We are blessed to have this Holiday in our calendar. It wasn't until 400 years after the first Thanksgiving that it was made an official holiday on our calendars. And did you know turkey, dressing, and pumpkin pie was NOT on the first Thanksgiving menu?

The Thanksgiving feast dates back to November 1621, when the newly arrived Pilgrims and the Wampanoag Indians gathered at Plymouth for an autumn harvest celebration. Venison was on the menu because, according to the History channel, the Wampanoag guests arrived with an offering of five deer. It is likely that the colonists feasted on what they had grown with the help of their Native American neighbors. Local vegetables included onions, beans, lettuce, spinach, cabbage, carrots, peas, and corn. Fruits indigenous to the region included blueberries, plums, grapes, gooseberries, raspberries and cranberries, which Native Americans ate and used as a natural dye. Pumpkins would have been on the menu but not in the form of pumpkin pie because sugar was in short supply.

We all know that without the Native Americans showing the pilgrims how to grow food and forage for fresh fruit, those of us with Anglo-Saxon immigrant ancestors may not be here today because our family members from those past generations would have starved to death. Thanks to our indigenous neighbors whose ancestors loved their new neighbors and saved the immigrants who "invaded" from Europe, we are able to celebrate Thanksgiving here this month.

Our country was founded on the principle of welcoming immigrants. Remember George Washington said this: "The bosom of America is open to receive not only the Opulent and respected Stranger, but the oppressed and persecuted of all Nations and Religions; whom we shall welcome to a participation of all our rights and privileges..."

With gratitude for our country's blessings, let us pray for those who are in danger today as they flee their violent countries and try to find refuge in safer places to live. And also pray for our country to remember our history this Thanksgiving and have compassion for the new immigrants seeking shelter, food, and medical care, struggling to survive in a very harsh world.

Here are some prayers to share with your family and friends on Thanksgiving and all other times, too:

I bless this day in the fullness of good it already contains, in the many occasions it offers to listen deeply, to be of service to others, to express gratitude moment by moment and to keep my mind so filled with love, beauty and joy that no negativity can find even the tiniest crack in which to set foot.

I bless this day in the infinite opportunities it gives me to love: to love and bless every human I meet, every beast or bird I pass by, every plant I behold, for all are but the manifold expressions of the infinite Life that undergirds all.

Truly, I bless this day for the wonderful adventure it can become as I walk through it with the eyes of wonder rather than boredom, use every opportunity to express peace rather than irritation, and chose love over fear.

AN ENCOURAGENT TO VOTE

Conceived in 1875 and delivered to the U.S. in 1885, the Statue of Liberty was a gift from France to commemorate an ideal we can barely recognize in 2018. Inscribed on the statue are these words:

"Give me your tired, your poor,
Your huddled masses yearning to breathe free,
The wretched refuse of your teeming shore.
Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed to me,



A Church of the Roses Tradition

Christmas is the season of giving!

Each year the Deacons organize the Giving Tree programs to help those in our community who are in need. This year the Deacons (with your help) will be partnering again with the YWCA to staff their Holiday Depot where they distribute gifts to the children of families associated with their many programs, including day care and the safe house for abused spouses.

The YWCA runs the only shelter in Sonoma County for battered spouses and their children. After they leave the shelter (the average stay is 8 to 10 weeks), they are followed by the YWCA to help them get back on their feet with housing, jobs, and child care.

We will have sign-up sheets available late in November for staffing the Holiday Depot during the week of December 17-21, and also for transporting the gifts from Heart Central (the Volunteer Center's gift clearing warehouse) to the YWCA.

We are going to ask the congregation to help us gather items to give to the families who come to pick up gifts, including toys in good condition, Christmas decorations, wrapping paper and ribbons/bows, children's books, and homemade cookies, (we will provide gift bags for these).

We are also sponsoring a Giving Tree with 50 hearts for gifts to children and the elderly which will be in Bowen Hall for three Sundays beginning December 2.

You know the routine: pick a heart, buy a present according to the age and interest of the recipient, wrap it, attach the heart, and return it to the Deacons for delivery to the Volunteer Center. If you would like to participate, but feel unable to shop, pick a heart and write a check to the Volunteer Center, and they will do the shopping and wrapping for you. As a third alternative, you can pick a Christmas card from the Giving Tree and contribute directly to the Deacons and we will use the funds to purchase gift cards for those needing a little assistance during the holiday season.

As always, Christmas is a very busy time for all of us, but we hope you will have enough time and energy to participate in these giving programs.


