

1. <u>Thecla: Independent woman of the Apocrypha</u>: This is a study of the Acts of Paul with a focus on his disciple, Thecla, who is one of the most interesting women in early Christian writing. Although she likely did not exist in real life, she represents many women who did, and her story gives us a powerful look at the role of women in early Christian society.

2. <u>The Acts of Thomas and Mission to India</u>: How did Christianity get to India? Did Thomas really travel across the Middle East and preach the gospel in South Asia? Historians debate these questions and more, but regardless of the literal truth, the Acts of Thomas provides spiritual guidance about humanity's place in the world and challenges us to liberate ourselves.

3. <u>Revelations that Didn't Make it into the Bible:</u> The New Testament Book of Revelation is not the only apocalypse narrative from the first centuries of the Common Era. In this lecture, you'll explore the content and theology of several other Christian apocalypses and consider why the Revelation to John made it into the canon while the many other apocalypses did not.

4. <u>Apocrypha after the New Testament</u>: Although the New Testament was codified in the fourth century, apocryphal books continued to be written into the Middle Ages. Round out the course by surveying the later Christian apocrypha and witness the way the creative flourishing of Biblical

writing continued through the Middle Ages and even into the present.

PCOR Sponsors SF Exploratorium Visit by Santa Rosa Kids By Guy Cottle

The big yellow bus arrived in front of Burbank Elementary School at about 8:30am. A quick head count confirmed twenty-six students, ages ten to eleven, five parent chaperones, and myself-Mr. Cottle. We noisily boarded the bus and our adventure began. We were headed to the San Francisco Exploratorium, a museum that features hands-on science exhibits. The Exploratorium has over six hundred displays that allow students to make observations, test hypotheses, and conduct experiments.

Ricky and Orion sat next to me on the bus. It was a real treat. They kept me entertained by debating about who could design the best restaurant. Ricky, whose nickname is Racoon, imagined a restaurant in which raccoons worked as waiters. When Orion pointed out that raccoons don't speak English, Ricky had an answer. He said, "Oh, my waiters have translation mics strapped to their chins." For some reason, Orion's waiters had eyeballs all over their arms. Ricky said "gross" and Orion explained, "Oh, the eyeballs are plastic and besides they wear long sleeve shirts when they work." It went on like this, back and forth, for the whole trip.

As we neared SF, I announced that everyone should get ready to hold their breath because we were approaching a tunnel. To my surprise, many of my students were not aware that if you hold your breath through a tunnel then you get to make a wish. Our bus became suddenly tranquil and quiet as we cruised through the Robin Williams Tunnel. Immediately past the tunnel, the San Francisco skyline came into view. We all "oohed" and "awed" as one.

For homework that night, our Burbank fifth graders wrote letters about their favorite science exhibits. Everyone seemed to have a different favorite.

Daniel wrote, "One exhibit showed how electricity worked. If you hold hands between two metal posts

then music plays because the electricity travels through your skin. Vanessa was wearing gloves so it wouldn't work for her."

Aizza wrote, "I saw a toothpick skyscraper. The man started building it when he was 14 years old and he is still building it now, 47 years later."

Jasmine wrote, "I loved the spinning sand exhibit. I was so busy playing with the sand that I didn't even know that my group had left me."

Ashlyn wrote, "There was a model of the moon that was bigger than our school. The tour guide said that all the craters were exactly in the right place, just like the moon."

Kimberly wrote, "I learned how butterflies can fly. There was this one exhibit where you had to flap the butterfly's wings to make it fly and then flap one side or another to make it turn."

Ricky wrote, "I saw a man dissecting a cow's eye. I learned that most animals have a green slimy thing in the back of their eye that allows them to see better in the dark."

Burbank Elementary School serves a population that has been financially challenged, especially over the past two years. Most of my students would have never had the opportunity to visit the Exploratorium if not for this field trip. For some of them, it was the first time they had visited San Francisco. In addition to allowing these Burbank students the opportunity to explore electricity, to learn about cow eyes, and to see the moon up close and personal, this field trip brought us together as a class. PCOR and the Church and World Committee made it possible. Thank you for your encouragement and support.

It was a wonderful day of learning, bonding, and exploring. It was a day of joy.


The current Russian invasion that started on February 24 follows eight years of conflict between Russia and Ukraine. Hundreds of thousands of people across the country are enduring bombings and assault by Russian military forces; and have lost power, been cut off from water and fuel. As people head toward the western regions, there is a shortage of food and other basic supplies. The reports of displaced persons inside Ukraine continue to rise every day, already in the hundreds of thousands. The UN anticipates that as many as 6.7 million will be displaced internally. Likewise, Ukrainians are fleeing to neighboring countries, primarily to Poland, Hungary, Moldova, Romania, Slovakia, while others have moved to other European countries. Again, current estimates from the UN are that the refugee numbers could also reach several million. These borders have remained open until now even as lines are growing.

Partners are raising particular concern for the women and young children who make up the majority of the refugees as many men are now barred from leaving the country. As part of the international humanitarian community, PDA urges that governments and non-governmental organizations provide assistance without discrimination due to concerns for the Roma and people of other nationalities who have also been displaced by the conflict.faith communities providing humanitarian assistance grows in the **months ahead**.

The needs for the response will be great. God's people are called on to stand in the "GAP" — Give. Act. Pray.
