

We are in dire need of more members in our committee.



FACTS ON HEARING LOSS - Hearing loss affects 20% of the US population (29 million people) and globally 1.33 billion people. That means 1 in 5 people you know at church are affected whether they realize it or not. It is the 3rd most prevalent adult health condi-



tion and it is often brought on by aging but can also be due to genetics, effects of medications and trauma through excessive loud noise exposure or even latent damage discovered many years after the damage was caused.

<u>HLAA SUPPORT GROUP AT PCOR</u> - Rich Osborne is a member of PCOR's health ministry and through them arranged for the Hearing Loss Association of America (<u>www.hearingloss.org</u>) support group to meet here monthly. We invite anyone interested in learning more or needing support with hearing loss to attend one of these meetings.

DONATION - Rich Osborne was instrumental in setting up our hearing loop system with his kind donation of a small hearing loop amplifier system to the church, that covers the last 6 pews in the sanctuary on the right hand side of the church aisle. Together with Norm Smith, who was looking for a design project for his Executive MBA program, Rich aided Norm in installing the hearing aid loop system last December. It is now up and running and is connected directly into the sound board providing an alternative to the FM receiver hearing assistance ear-bud style amplifier devices.

*There are no plans to discontinue the availability of the FM receiver systems for those wanting to still use them and for those who do not have a T-coil compatible hearing aid.

HOW TO MAKE USE OF THIS SYSTEM ? - If you have a type of hearing aid with a Tera-Coil (often called T-Coil) you can make use of the new hearing aid loop system mentioned above by switching your hearing aid to "T-Coil mode". The benefits are clearer sound as only the voices and music that are amplified by the churches sound system are played back through your hearing aid and back ground noise is eliminated.

If you are a worship leader, or making an announcement, please be aware that the sound system will not pick up your sound unless you make use of a microphone. This means anyone using the hearing aid loop system will also not be able to hear you. This is also important for your voice to be heard by the home bound people or our website visitors that only listen to our recorded worship services.

2. An explanation of your audiogram by Marya (pronounced Mariah) Kimble

Au.D. I am certain that you will enjoy and benefit from Marya. She has worked as a clinical audiologist at Kaiser Permanente for 13 years. She earned her Masters at San Francisco University in Communicative Disorders and a Doctorate of Audiology from A.T Still University. She will explain the different types of hearing loss and outcomes with hearing aids. **Marya asks that you bring a copy of your audiogram to the meeting to share.**

3. Time for sharing victories, however small, over hearing loss situations and difficult issues you are encountering.

Contemplative Practices and Centered Living by Felipa Jones

In today's fast-paced and busy world, it's easy to get off balanced, and feel overwhelmed, un-eased, disconnected and off-centered. That's why it's so important to cultivate contemplative practices in our everyday lives.

Contemplative practices are tools that allow us to maintain personal and community health and wellbeing, as well as cultivate mindfulness, awareness, wisdom, tolerance, acceptance and compassion. They deepen our relationship with God, and increase awareness of the presence of God They have many other benefits, in our lives. including: improving focus and attention, enhancing critical thinking, improving life & relationship skills, reducing stress, enhancing creativity, feeling interconnected with all of creation, and feeling happiness and peace. They allow us to PAUSE and CREATE A SPACE so we may perceive things in a different way and experience things more fully. Being mindful means being open and attentive in the present moment, and being awake to the fullness of each experience as it happens, without judging it as good or bad, right or wrong.


There are many contemplative practices. It is important to find practices that are most meaningful and are best suited for your needs. Regular, daily practice is important, and it can be done individually or in a group setting. You can create your own tree of contemplative practices in the blank tree attached.

These contemplative practices can be thought as **a tree of life**, with the **roots** representing the two basic intentions (communication & connection, and awareness), and the **branches** representing the different contemplative practices. The practices include:

- **Stillness practices** meditation, quieting the mind and body, silence, calmness, focusing, centering, praying, contemplation, connecting with nature
- **Generative practices** creating thoughts/feelings of devotion and compassion: lectio divina, visualization, loving-kindness meditation

- Activist practices pilgrimages, work, volunteering, vigils, marches, bearing witness
- **Creative practices** contemplative arts: painting religious icons, weaving prayer shawls, stringing rosaries, hand-binding journals, painting spiritualmotif cards, music, singing, journaling, writing poetry
- **Movement practices** labyrinth walking, walking meditation, yoga, dance, Qigong, Tai Chi, hiking
- **Relational practices** council circle, dialogue, deep listening, story-telling
- **Ritual or cyclic practices** ceremonies and rituals specific to spiritual/cultural traditions, retreats, creation of a sacred space




