take chances with risky behavior is also a way to love them. Wearing a mask shows you care about others. Washing your hands often and touching your face or hugging each other is difficult, but an important and meaningful self-

sacrifice. Martin Luther believed the devil was tempting people to be careless to increase death rates. May we be careful and not empower the devil, too, by endangering ourselves or our beloved church family members and friends.

Still remaining at home and not coming to the church (or to social gatherings) is the safest way to survive. Until an effective vaccine is developed, you are very vulnerable if you are in the over 65 age group, and/or have health problems (high blood pressure, diabetes, lung or cardiac issues or obesity). If suffering a severe case of Co-Vid 19 doesn't worry you, then do not take a chance because you may be spreading it to others unbeknownst. And please remember to pray for all who must expose themselves to Co-Vid because (like Martin Luther and his wife) they have to care for those who are ill when there is no one else to provide such care.

In 1527 Marin Luther wrote an essav during the terrible bubonic plaque titled: "Whether One Can Flee from the Deadly Plague." Luther was working and living in Wittenberg, Germany and his wife was pregnant. They were given a chance to leave for the countryside where it was safer away from the contagion. But Martin Luther refused and they opened up their private home to become a public ward for the sick in an era when there were very few hospitals. In the essay he said. "We are bound to each other in such a way that no one may forsake the other in his distress."

Luther explained the importance of caring for our neighbor. He wrote about the importance of community and taking the necessary steps to protect others. And he emphasized serving others on behalf of Christ. Martin Luther believed that life is good and should be protected, but at the same time he promoted trust that death has been overcome in Jesus. "Death has no ultimate power over us." God wants us to live and love and serve. He said, "take courage in the fact that we are mutually bound together."

Dr. Beth Felker Jones wrote a devotional book titled: Pandemic Prayers. She believes Luther's essay applies to our circumstances today. There is a section in his essay that reveals his disgust with people who don't take the plaque seriously:

"They are rash and reckless, tempting God and disregarding everything that might counteract death from the plague....They make sport of it and wish to prove how independent they are. This is not trusting God but tempting him. Such people behave as though a house was burning in the city and nobody is trying to put out the fire. Instead they give leeway to the flames and the whole city is consumed. If some are so foolish as to not take precautions, but aggravate the contagion, then the devil has a field day and many more will die."

Staying at home is what neighborly love looks like now. Helping your neighbors not

Masks have become the new fashion


statement of course, and Dee Andrea is an accomplished seamstress. Here is one of her creations that she made for us to wear. Disney fans will recognize the fabric!

We were going to have to give up when Nita Pinney sent us a zip lock bag full of yeast!! *Thank-you Nita!!* He is Risen indeed!




It has not all been fun and games though. This has been such a challenging time for teachers and students. We have to take all of our classes online

Call To Offering!

THANK YOU for your ongoing generosity to Church of The Roses, especially during these COVID19 times, that prevents face-face worship and our usual plate collection.

DID YOU KNOW THAT WE HAVE 3 WAYS in which you can donate and send in your offerings to the church via the convenience of electronic payment?

PAYPAL, VANCO, or BILLPAY!

We take both PAYPAL and VANCO/PC USA. Links can be accessed on the homepage of our website at www.churchoftheroses.org. See buttons below.

There is a small service fee (nominally ~2%) associated with either payment method but it saves you the trouble of



having to write a check and buy postage and it ensures a steady stream of donations to PCOR.

Most people are familiar with *PAYPAL* to purchase or donate securely online.

VANCO is similar but specializes in donations to churches with the fee going to PCUSA. The Presbyterian Foundation, in partnership with Vanco Payment Solutions (a PCI complaint platform), provides a safe, secure way to donate to PCOR. Donors can set up recurring donations by either debit/credit card or electronic fund transfers. An offset option allows them to cover all or part of the transaction fee. They can view, edit, and monitor payment history.

THE THIRD METHOD also ensures that the church continues to receive a steady income even when you are unable to be there in person to contribute to the weekly plate collection. You can use the BILL PAY option with your bank to set up automatic recurring weekly or monthly payments, just like auto paying your AAA membership or PG&E Bill. For most banking institutions there is usually no service fee associated with this payment method. You can either set it up to have the bank send us a check or you can request our banking information to set it up as a direct deposit. Contact finance@churchoftheroses.ora for our banking information to set up direct deposit BILL PAY with your bank.

WORSHIP We have been continuing to have monthly meetings via Zoom. A deep appreciation for the incredible work and dedication of Pastor Cindy, Norm, Steve Yeager, Myles, Althea, and Chris Rhodes was mentioned, as well as the excellent virtual worships provided.

There is still no definite date on resumption of actual services, but virtual access to services will continue even after actual services resume, until everyone feels comfortable returning to church for health reasons. We are looking into the possibility of starting actual services in an outdoor location to decrease exposure to the virus once we receive the ok by the public health county officer. These outdoor services could happen at church or other nearby places (Westminster Woods, Spring Lake), or in Bowen Hall to accommodate recommended physical distancing directives. TECH-TIPS FOR ZOOM VIRTUAL WORSHIP

Can you believe we have now spent two month's as a faithcommunity, worshiping virtually?

It has been lovely to see all of your smiling faces and to chat with you during our social time. As you will have noticed, we have made some investment into computer-friendly microphones and mixers to enhance the audio quality of our live Zoom services. Thank you to all of those that provided us feedback, especially in



the early weeks, as we learned how to do this and grappled with slow internet speed issues, and computer equipment for our video and microphones.

Here are some tech-tips for ensuring you and all our participants have a satisfactory Zoom worship experience as we continue to rely on this technology until such time as we can worship at full church capacity in person.

- MUTE your microphone during the service, unless you are actively presenting in the service.
- <u>Switch OFF</u> your video during the service, unless you are actively presenting in the service.
- <u>Switch ON your video and microphone</u> for social time after the service when prompted to do so by your Zoom host.
- <u>If you are dialing</u> into the audio only portion via a landline or cellular phone please note that your microphone will not be something that we can mute from the hosts computer controls. So please mute your phone directly with the phones mute button or if that is not possible, to avoid interruption for others listening to the worship service, please refrain from singing along or dialing in from a noisy environment.
- <u>During social time</u>, be cognizant of others desires to perhaps share a few words, and keep your updates brief, to give others an opportunity to share. Avoid speaking over others by pausing between conversation to allow for internet latency/delays (like the old days when talking long distance on the land line), expect a slight delay before the other person responds.
- <u>The meeting invite</u> is published via the church email each week and remains the same every week. Email the office if you are not receiving the weekly emails and would like to.

Thank you to all of those who contribute to our Zoom services, whether it is to worship/participate or to provide music, video/audio pre-recorded content, liturgy, sermons, the bulletin, feedback or technical support, we could not do this without each and every one of you.

PCOR REOPENING TASK FORCE

The Session, at the April meeting, established and selected the following elders to act as the Reopening Task Force of PCOR. Deborah Baker, Chris Rhodes, Kim Seamans, Gary Smith, and Jim Taylor, Chair, along with Pastor Cindy will be working to take the steps needed to reopen the church as soon as it is safe to do so.

The task force will be relying on County and State Guidelines in determining how to effectively and safely reopen PCOR. The church insurance broker, ChurchWest, is also providing valuable information on how to best get back to worship in the facility. With PCOR operating both a church and preschool; there are different guidelines coming out for each entity that will have to be sorted out and applied. Additionally, the outside groups that use our facility must also be considered.

The Task Force is working on creating a procedure list so all that who enter the facility will be safe to participate in church activities.

All outside door locks have been changed and new keys have been made. For now, no volunteers will be working in the office until further notice. Office staff will be working on a limited basis.

To date, we have applied and been approved for the National Government's Payroll Protection Plan (PPP) to take care of and retain personnel.
