#### **HAPPY SPRING!**

The Spring Equinox this year lands on March 19th. That is the day when we will have an equal amount of dark as we have of light all around the world. That information is according to the Farmer's Almanac. I remember our family looking at a paperback Farmer's Almanac diligently when I grew up on the farm to predict the weather forecast, and the best time to plant corn and soybeans.

Now you can find the almanac online. It is a very popular website to consult about astronomy, gardening, health, food, and information for kids. There is even a store where you can purchase seeds, calendars, socks, home goods and a weather rock. Did you ever have a weather rock? My Dad made one that came with this sign on it:



Here are a few uplifting passages that celebrate Springtime:

Isaiah 35:1: "The wilderness and the dry land shall be glad, the desert shall rejoice and blossom; like the crocus it shall blossom abundantly, and rejoice with joy and singing."

James 5:7: "Be patient, then, brothers and sisters, until the Lord's coming. See how the farmer waits for the land to yield its valuable crop, patiently waiting for the autumn and spring rains." The Lenten Season and the Spring season coincide. Although we believe Lent is meant to be a time for fasting and repentance, the Lenten Season doe not have to be depressing. There is much to learn from taking time to contemplate the fragility of life, to make an assessment of where your life might need refocusing, or a time to let go of burdens you are carrying and give them to God.

As we focus on the journey Jesus takes to the cross, let us take time to contemplate our own journeys. Assess if we are living our lives with an awareness of how short and fragile life is for each of us and especially for those who are vulnerable and suffering. Meditate on listening for God's voice calling each of us to reach out to those in our midst and beyond who need a reassurance that their lives matter.

You can make the desert in someone else's life rejoice and blossom. You can help them have hope for Spring rain that will revitalize their life in new ways.

Be love in action in all the places you go. Here are some ideas for ways you can help revitalize your Church of the Roses:

- Volunteer to help trim the roses around the church
- Help B & G plant and beautify the garden area
- Join the worship committee and help us decorate the church for Easter
- Join the choir and help them prepare beautiful music for the Easter Cantata
- Join the Bell choir and present beautiful bells one Sunday a month
- Volunteer with the membership committee to host a pre-worship Coffee time outside the church once a month
- Help our church fundraise to re-paint the outside of the church sanctuary and provide new computer projection equipment for worship services.

Words to ponder about change this Lenten season from John O'Donohue's

#### To Bless the Space Between Us

"Within the grip of winter, it is almost impossible to imagine the spring. The gray perished landscape is shorn of color. Only bleakness meets the eye; everything seems severe and edged. Winter is the oldest season; it has some quality of the absolute. Yet beneath the surface of winter, the miracle of spring is already in preparation; the cold is relenting; seeds are wakening up. Colors are beginning to imagine how they will return. Then, imperceptibly, somewhere one bud opens and the symphony of renewal is no longer reversible. From the black heart of winter a miraculous, breathing plenitude of color emerges."

"The beauty of nature insists on taking its time. Everything is prepared. Nothing is rushed. The rhythm of emergence is a gradual slow beat always inching its way forward; change remains faithful to itself until the new unfolds in the full confidence of true arrival. Because nothing is abrupt, the beginning of spring nearly always catches us unawares. It is there before we see it; then we can look nowhere without seeing it...

So often we look back on patterns of behavior, the kind of decisions we make repeatedly and that have failed to serve us well, and we aim for a new and more successful path or way of living. But change is difficult for us. So often we opt to continue the old pattern, rather than risking the danger of difference. We are also often surprised by change that seems to arrive out of nowhere. We find ourselves crossing some new threshold we had never anticipated. Like spring secretly at work within the heart of winter, below the surface of our lives huge changes are in fermentation. We never suspect a thing. Then when the grip of some longenduring winter mentality beings to loosen, we find ourselves vulnerable to a flourish of possibility and we are suddenly negotiating the challenge of a threshold."

John O'Donohue asks questions that are good to ponder during Lent: "At any time you can ask yourself:

- At which threshold am I now standing?
- At this time in my life, what am I leaving?
- Where am I about to enter?
- What is preventing me from crossing my next threshold?

To acknowledge and cross a new threshold is always a challenge. It demands courage and also a sense of trust in whatever is emerging. This becomes essential when a threshold opens suddenly in front of you, one for which you had no preparation. This could be illness, suffering or loss. Because we are so engaged with the world, we usually forget how fragile life can be and how vulnerable we always are. It takes only a couple of seconds for a life to change irreversibly."

"Each life is a mystery that is never finally available to the mind's light or questions. That we are here is a huge affirmation; somehow life needed us and wanted us to be. To sense and trust this primeval acceptance can open a vast spring of trust within the heart. It can free us into a natural courage that casts out fear and opens up our lives to become voyages of discovery, creativity, and compassion. No threshold need be a threat, but rather an invitation and a promise. Whatever comes, the great sacrament of life will remain faithful to us, blessing us always with visible signs of invisible grace. We merely need to trust." Amen.

From the time when Drs. Lesley and Cynthia Morgan first went to serve as co-workers with the Church of Bangladesh, Church of the Roses has contributed to their support. Mary Frances Reed wrote to them in the early days and sent presents to their young children. We were moved by letters they sent about their work










and welcomed them when they were able to come to our church. We grieved with them when they lost one of their sons to cancer. Now they are retiring from their years of faithful and loving service in that often troubled Asian country. We thank them for work well done and wish them blessings in their retirement years.

The Church and World Committee has chosen a new Mission-Coworker to support. Her name is Cindy Corell. The gardens in Haiti are quite different from the large garden Cindy worked on the farm where she grew up in Augusta County, VA. But the crops are similar, and the love and respect Haitian farmers have for the land is the same as her father's. It is part of what drew Cindy to this work as a companionship facilitator with FONDAMA, the advocacy network in Haiti aligned with the Presbyterian Hunger Program. A major difference, though, is the struggles Haitian farmers face in keeping the land and working it. FONDATMA seeks out the root causes of Haiti's poverty such as land-grabbing and profit-robbing food imports and fight them with advocacy campaigns. "The people of Haiti work hard and are faithful to God," Cindy says. "This is humbling work."

Church of the Roses will now be contributing to Cindy Corell's support each year. We will keep in touch with her to learn about her work in Haiti. If the opportunity should arise we will invite her to visit our church.





#### **FINANCE**

With one month in the books, not much to report. Operating just a skosh under breakeven there is nothing to worry over. Cash reserves remain adequate but with an aging facility we have capital needs and our reserves will be tapped. Our B&G Committee is working on a prioritization of needed capital projects. An example is replacing all of the hard surfaces in the front of the Church because of the trip hazards from buckling concrete.

Also, if all members could try to add \$32 to their pledge (both husband and wife a PCOR member, \$32 each) to cover the "per capita" assessment from PCUSA. We look to your pledge as \$ we can operate our church with and separate giving to cover this pass through expense that goes to PCUSA would be very helpful..... Thank you.

Tsuru for Solidarity is a nonviolent, direct action project of Japanese American social justice advocates working to end detention sites and support front-line im-

migrant and refugee communities that are being targeted by racist, inhumane immigration policies. Standing on the moral authority of the unjust incarceration of Japanese Americans and legacy of U.S. concentration camps during WWII, we say, "Stop Repeating History!" We demand that no matter where someone came from or how they arrived to the United States, they be treated with dignity and respect. TSURU means crane in Japanese, and symbolizes peace, compassion, hope and healing. Show your solidarity with our cause by using the traditional Japanese folk art of paper folding (origami) to fold a paper crane.

#### FIRST PRINCIPLES

- 1. God is in charge. Actions that are in harmony with God will succeed in their objectives; those that are in disharmony with God will fail. [Compare to Allah Akbar (an Islamic phrase, called *Takbir* in Arabic), meaning "God is greater" or God is [the] greatest".]
- 2. God is spirit. God has no physical form, but may be present spiritually in physical phenomena. Spiritual forces are more powerful than physical forces. [Compare to John 4:24 "God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and in truth."]
- 3. All persons, all creatures, all living things, even the earth, the galaxy, and the cosmos itself, are equally subject to God's law\*, and are to be respected accordingly. Abandon the notion that mankind has been given dominion over the earth and all of its creatures. \* God's law is the aggregate of all natural laws, physical and spiritual, known and yet to become known. All scientific research, and all philosophy, is directed to learning more of God's law.
- **4.** Treat all other persons as you yourself wish to be treated. [Compare to Matthew 7:12 So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets.]
- 5. Do not seek personal gain by fraud or deceit, but be worthy of the trust of everyone. [Compare to Matthew 5:37 "Let your word be 'Yes, yes' or 'No, no': anything more that this comes from the evil one."]
- **6. Violence is not an acceptable response to perceived injustice.** [Compare to Matthew 5:22 ". . . if you are angry with a brother or sister you will be liable to judgment; . . . "]
- 7. Teach the children; care for the children first; assure that coming generations will know, and be strong, and respect the "First Principles".
- 8. Give your full attention to this day, for yesterday is but a dream and tomorrow is in the hands of the Lord. [Compare to Matthew 6:27-34 "And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life?" Etc.]
- 9. Stand up straight; admire the world; relish the love of a gentle partner; trust in the Lord.
