WHAT WOULD JESUS DO

IN THE MIDST OF A PANDEMIC, WILDFIRES, AND NATIONAL CHAOS?

It may seem that these are the worst of times and the worst of times... Lately I have been looking at the world through fogged up glasses from wearing my mask. But life seems especially difficult these days in many ways. We've lost another precious church member, we are still waiting to have permission to worship inside, our region is under great threat of wildfires once again, and the virus is still running rampant in the US. So I wonder, how would Jesus handle such a time as this? Let's look at scripture for his way of dealing with difficulties:

1st - Jesus would be a good citizen and vote. Then he would remember that nothing can separate us from the love of God.

"I am convinced that nothing can ever separate us from God's love. No power in the sky above or in the earth below – indeed, nothing in all creation will ever be able to separate us from the love of God that is revealed in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Rom. 8:38,39)

2nd - Jesus would want us to love our neighbors and focus our hearts and minds on showing love to others during this time. Whenever and wherever you get the opportunity, show the fruit of the Spirit: "the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. (Galatians 5: 22)

3rd - Jesus would remind us of these words from Isaiah 41 and trust that God is with us to the end: "do not fear, for I am with you, do not be afraid, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my right hand."

4th - Jesus would pray. When things get tough, the tough pray. In Matthew 26:41 Jesus said: "Watch and pray so that you will not enter into temptation. For the spirit is willing, but the body is weak."

5th - Jesus would also say to focus on the good in the world and not let the bad times overwhelm us. Memorize Philippians 4: 4-9:

"Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Finally, beloved,* whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about* these things. ⁹Keep on doing the things that you have learned and received and heard and seen in me, and the God of peace will be with you."

We will get through this one way or another. May we get through these times together and by faithfully following the ways of Jesus. Amen.

Zooming in to Advent




Without the possibility of having our traditional Advent Study at church we will be joining all the teachers who are doing their classes remotely.

DON'T GET SCAMMED

<u>NEVER give agencies that call you any private information</u> - no matter how urgent they sound. Hang up without saying anything and then look up the actual agency's number in the phone book, on a bill, or on their official website. If in doubt, YOU call them and tell them about the phone call you received. Remember, official agencies never sound urgent.

LOCAL SCAMS

PG&E: An official sounding call from PG&E claiming that your power will be turned off is a scam. If unsure, hang up and call PG&E's actual phone number on your bill or from their website. A call to PG&E assured us that they are NOT currently shutting power down due to nonpayment.

SOCIAL SECURITY OFFICE - The Social Security Office does not call anyone.

INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE – The IRS will not threaten jail over the phone nor will you be hearing from them by phone regarding your paperwork. They communicate in writing. If in doubt, look up their **official phone number** and give them a call or speak with your tax preparer.

GAS STATION PUMPS – Try to wiggle the part of the machine that takes your card. Skimmers get placed inside this part of the mechanism to copy your card information. According to Bank of America, the best precaution against having your card information stolen is to PAY INSIDE.

USE PAYPAL ONLINE – Most online vendors allow you to pay for items via a secure Paypal account that has your bank, debit, or credit card information stored. In this manner, you do not have to input your card information onto every vendor site. The vendor only sees that you paid via Paypal without ever seeing your card number. Paypal will NOT send you an email asking you to update your information. If you do choose to use a regular card, avoid saving the card information on a vendor site if you can help it.

<u>NEVER CLICK ON AN EMAIL LINK</u> for an agency or bank that wants you to update your information. Read the email and then go to your web browser and type in the agency or bank and find their official website or look for their information on a bill. Contact them in this way to see if there is actually an issue.

Warning Signs: fuzzy logos, agencies or banks that rarely or never email you, a feeling of urgency (the word "immediate").

NEVER respond to emails from your loved ones or acquaintances asking for money. Do NOT hit Reply. No one asks for money via email because it is a popular scam. If in doubt, CALL your loved one and confirm the request.

Warning Signs: a request for money or gift card, sense of urgency in the email, behavior that is out of character, and/or someone that rarely emails you, claims of being trapped in another country.

REPORT IT:

If you believe you or someone you know may have been a victim of fraud, contact your local <u>FBI</u> <u>field office</u> or <u>submit a tip online</u>. You can also file a complaint with the FBI's <u>Internet Crime Complaint Center</u>.

Finding Gratitude

Tick, tock tick, tock, two more months — to go and we can put 2020 in the rear-view mirror. It certainly has been one of the most miserable years in recent memory. A global pandemic, job loss and financial hardship, the feeling of isolation that comes from having to quarantine, not to mention fires, evacuations, power shut offs...... I don't think any of us will be looking back on this year with fond memories.

November is here and with it Thanksgiving and what in the world do we have to be thankful for? I found myself asking this very question at the end of a long week of distance teaching. It was a welcome break pursuing this line of thought. Most of us have not been in a space that included thinking about things to be thankful for in quite a while. As I compiled a mental list, I found myself feeling better. It turns out that there was a scientific study conducted by professors Robert Emmons and Michael McCullough on the psychological and physiological effects of being grateful. According to the study an attitude of gratitude lowers blood pressure, reduces stress, and slows down neurodegeneration as we age. It also increases oxytocin which fosters a sense of calm and security. If there was a prescription drug that did all of this, people would be beating down the door of the pharmacy to get it!

So, what do we have to be grateful for? For myself I am grateful that even though Dee Andrea and I are isolated from our family, technology has enabled us to stay in touch nearly every day. And of course, even though my work as a teacher and as a music director has changed rather radically, I am still able to do my jobs and bring some joy to my communities. As a church we have been able to worship together when so many other churches have struggled with distance and in person services, and we should be so grateful that we have members of our community that are technically savvy enough to make that happen. We should also be grateful in the knowledge that this pandemic will not last forever and that someday (hopefully soon) we will have a working vaccine and can return to some form of normal. Indeed, even in the midst of our struggles there are still many things to be thankful for, as the poet laureated Maya Angelou once said "Be present in all things and thankful for all things."

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

FINANCE


Year to date financials reflect about \$30,000 in losses. However, we have yet to recognize the debt forgiveness of our PPP loan. The PPP loan program was part of the first stimulus program approved by the Government to help businesses during the pandemic. If all proceeds were used to continue paying our employees so they could keep their jobs then the loan would be forgiven. When we process the forgiveness paperwork and make the accounting entries we will bring into income about \$45,000. So at our current rate of losses, 2020 should turn out to be about a breakeven.

Our liquidity or reserves are quite adequate. We recently were awarded with a very nice bequest from a recently deceased member and expect to receive the money early next year.

The 2021 Stewardship campaign has launched and you all should have received in the mail a letter with your pledge card. Please consider the importance of our church to us all, especially in these times. If you don't rely on the Church that much, think of a day you might need to and think of your gifts as "paying it forward".

Regardless of what motivates you, please be generous as you always have.....thank you.


Sonoma County's Secret Santa brings joy to tens of thousands of children and families in need during the holidays. This year's program will be a virtual version of traditional giving.

Often a problem arises, Creating havoc in our life. We can't seem to get our act together, Confused from all the strife.


Storm clouds look like giant tornadoes, Leaving our thoughts whirling to and fro. As fears and doubt accumulate, Our sorrows grow and grow!
