He is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Yay! It is the Easter Season!

Think about it, if Jesus Christ had not Risen from the dead, we would not be a church today. What would the world be like without Jesus? What would Santa Rosa be like without our Church and many ministries?

We have much to be thankful for at the Church of the Roses at this point in time!

- This Easter we don't have to just show a video of the service. We get to be in-person outside! It will be such a lovely service together.
- The majority of the congregation has received a vaccine! Thanks be to God we made it through the pandemic without losing church members to Covid-19. Keep vigilant with your masks and distancing so we can continue to celebrate our survival!
- We received two PPP loans that helped us keep most of our staff on board and hopefully we will be able to reopen Rosebud Preschool soon!
- The outdoor worship services attracted some new attendees to worship with us! We are considering continuing them once a month even after we are able to be in the sanctuary because so many people enjoyed the outdoor worship experience.
- Our congregation has shown adaptability, resilience, and incredible technological ability during this time when we averaged about 60 attendees on Zoom each Sunday and about 100 views of our worship service on Facebook Live, too. The KSRO radio program has also attracted 50% more listeners to the early 6:30am worship service recording, too. KSRO is thankful as well.
- The reopening task force has thoughtfully considered allowing groups to use our church facility again and it appears we can have groups meet inside in May with masking and social distancing.
- We can see the light at the end of the tunnel of this pandemic and Santa Rosa has come through it without losing too many jobs or businesses. Our little town is going to survive and thrive and our Church of the Roses along with it. Thanks be to God for a chance to recover well and continue our ministry to the community.

I do humbly ask for your prayers for the families of those who passed during the pandemic due to other causes: Jeannette Nichols, Gwen Christiansen, Lucy Poindexter, and Helen Burns. And please pray for those on hospice care now: Betsy Yeager and Luu Maxwell. Such precious souls will forever be missed in our pews. But we can be thankful for the time well spent with them and the lovely memories of friendship during their participation at PCOR.

Remember: When Jesus rose from the dead, death was defeated. One day your life will transition onward to the next stage of eternal life. But in the meantime, Jesus understands our grief when a beloved church family member passes. He does more than understand; He also acts. Jesus will not let death reign forever. On the cross He defeated death, and His resurrection is your guarantee that one day, you, too, will experience a life of glory and peace with him in heaven. And one day Jesus is coming again to end physical death and to usher in a new heaven and a new earth where there will be no dying, no tears, and no sorrow. (Revelation 21:1-4). So until that day may the resurrection of Jesus on Easter morning be the hope we cling to and the reassurance that you are loved deeply by God who knew you before you were born and who never abandons you in eternal life.

We Have Seen Jesus (from John 20:1-18) by Ann Weems 1934-2016

O Lamb of God! O Lamb of God! O Lamb of God! With the slaying of the paschal lambs, you died upon a tree. Your sheep scattered and hid in darkness weeping. It was over. Three days those who loved him huddled, their hearts trembling, their faces swollen from tears. They would no longer see Jesus. He himself had said from the cross, It is finished. They felt finished, too. While the early morning had not yet found its sun, on that first day of the week, Mary Magdalene walked through the darkness to the tomb and found the stone rolled away.

She ran and found Peter and that other disciple whom Jesus loved. They have taken Jesus out of the tomb, she said, and we don't know where to find him. Peter came into the tomb and saw the linens lying there, the head linen rolled up by itself. Then the other disciple came into the tomb and he saw and he believed. He saw and he believed. We who have sought these Lenten days to see Jesus ... do we see and do we believe? Who do we say that he is? He is the one who gathers the children to himself. He is the one who speaks with women, even foreign women, even Gentile women, even women of the streets. He is the one who sits down to eat with tax collectors. He is the one who eats with sinners. He is the one who touches lepers. He is the One. The disciples went home. But not Mary ... no, not Mary ... she stayed, she wept. She bent to look into the tomb, and there she saw two angels, one at the foot where Jesus had lain and one at the head. "Woman," they asked, "why are you weeping?" "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." I do not know where he is! Did you not know I would be about my Father's business? Who do you say that I am? Mary said, Rabboni. Having turned, she saw whom she believed to be the gardener. Woman, why are you weeping? Whom do you seek? "Sir, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." All Jesus had to say was "Mary!"

Mary, Mary, Mary, Oh, Mary, Do you not know me? "Rabboni!" Yes, she knew him. She knew Jesus. She ran to tell the others: "I have seen Jesus." And there it is ... our Lenten search, that which we have waited for, that which we have sought, that which we have worked for. He is not some goody-goody god; he is Justice he is Mercv he is Humility he is Love. And Mary saw him; Mary knew him; Mary followed; Mary believed; Mary ran to tell the others. Later that night, when the doors were shut. Jesus came to them and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you" as he always did, and he said it again. after he had shown them his hands and his side. "Peace be with you." From the beginning it had been Peace. It was the song of the angels in Bethlehem. It was the song of Jesus, and Peter preached it to the people: "You know the message God sent to the people of Israel, preaching peace by Jesus Christ. He is Lord of all." If we see Jesus, we know that he preached peace, but the thing that's so hard for us is this: we do see Jesus, and we know Mary and Peter and all the others believed that we are to love our neighbors as ourselves,

but that was then and this is now and it is a different world. We are a different people. Can't we disciple in a more modern way? Not everyone can preach peace. Can't we be on the kitchen committee? Can't we make more rules? Can't we write a check? And yet, and yet and yet, he said, as God sent me I send you. Receive the Holy Spirit. He sent them out iust as he sends us out to all the nations to tell God's story of peace and goodwill. Easter comes. The shroud that covered the world is destroyed: for our God has swallowed death. We shall no longer look for him among the dead. He calls to us to follow, to believe in our hearts that the people of this world will someday love one another. Really Love one another. If we believe, we know that that is not a naive hope, but God's promise. We shall not die. but we will live in him who died for us. On Easter morning and on every morning, let us in chorus sing: "This is the day the Lord has made; Let us rejoice and be glad in it!" And then with Mary, let us run to tell the others: We have seen Jesus!"

April 4, Easter Sunday, In-person, outdoor worship on the patio, 10am



Barbara Basham shops regularly at Trader Joes. She visits the cereal shelves, strolls among the frozen foods, and shops her way past the steaks, chicken, and pork chops. As a matter routine, she buys her family TJ's one pound chocolate almond bar. Barbara is a fan of TJ's, but when it comes to the produce section? She puts her chin in the air and walks right past.

"They double plastic wrap everything, and I just won't have it. I can't stand seeing all that plastic in my garbage," she explained.

Barbara gets it. A dollar spent, at any given store, is essentially a

vote cast to support the continued marketing of a given product. As consumers with money in our pockets, we pick the winners.

The concept "dollar voting" is not new. In 1986, John Buchanan was awarded the Nobel Prize for Economics developing the Public Choice Theory. He argued that economic participation is a pure form of democracy. The idea in practice goes back even further. We have all heard stories about those hardheaded upstarts in Boston who once refused to purchase British tea. Dollar voting has been around in America since before the first dollar was even printed.

A few years ago, Chris and Ellen Bowen decided to buy solar panels for their home. As it turns out, they save quite a bit of money each month. Saving money, though, was not their only motive.

"Chris has been a lifelong advocate for conservation, recycling and Earth care. God's gifts are all around us. Chris and I believe that we are the stewards of his gifts," said Ellen.

Mrs. Basham's decisions at TJ's clearly checks the box for more chocolate almond bars and less plastic with our food. The Bowens voted for lower electricity bills and more independence from PG&E. From the smallest purchase to the largest, in America, our purchase decisions count. We shape the world of tomorrow by how we spend our money today.

With hope born in our faith in God, with prayers and vigilance, we can make a difference. We have done it before. Let's go out today and vote for a sustainable tomorrow.




FINANCE

Through February revenue is behind expectation but thankfully we have been doing a nice job holding expenses down such that the year-to-date operating loss is only a couple of thousand dollars. Reserves remain quite adequate for potential capital projects and operating losses.

We received another PPP loan as a part of the latest economic stimulus program. As with our first one these loans are forgivable as long as we use it mainly for payroll. It ends up being an infusion of cash into our operation to help mitigate the impact of the pandemic.

With the easing of restrictions, we are considering reopening the facility to small group activities. Please contact Ruth or Pastor Cindy.



RACIST? Confronting Your Role in Racial Injustice KERRY CONNELLY


When it comes to race, most white Americans are obsessed with two things: defending our own inherent goodness and




DEACONS

Quarryhill Botanical Garden is one of the most exotic and biologically diverse places in Sonoma Valley. Admission is \$10 (seniors).

Quarryhill is located on Highway 12, just north of the Arnold Drive intersection.
