## **ROSEBUD PRESCHOOL**

We have begun work on reopening the school in the summer. Our plan is to reopen Monday, June 7 with one small cohort of children and staff. Preschools are subject to state Licensing regulations and Public Health requirements that are different from public schools.

We will be following best practices to keep our families and staff safe. We are asked to keep our childcare groups as small and consistent as reasonably feasible. Only children and staff may enter the school. We will be requiring masks of all children and staff unless they are separated by six feet. Everyone is excited to be coming back together again. And while we will spend the majority of our time outside with one small group inside at a time, that is not all that different from our normal summer programs.

We have also begun enrollment for the fall and are cautiously optimistic that we will be able to bring back more families to the school.

## Understanding the New Testament




While the congregation is still worshipping outside we will continue to have craft and coloring tables set up


We applied for and received our second PPP forgivable loan bringing the total of our free money from the government's stimulus program to \$158,000. THANK YOU TAX PAYERS!!

We will have a reorganizational meeting in early July. Stay tuned!


## **CAMERA CLUB**

## The PCUSA Pentecost Offering



Your Church and World Committee voted to collect this important church-wide offering this year. Each year on Pentecost Sunday, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit and the birthday of the church. The Holy Spirit remains with us still, connecting us with the church of the past, continuing to inspire the church of today, and pointing us to the church of the future. Each year, this celebration is marked by Pentecost Offering receiving the which nurtures the faith of those who are the church to come – children, youth, and young adults.

25% of the Offering is used to inspire and equip Young Adult Volunteers for mission work. 25% supports youth ministries and helps young people at risk. 10% of it goes to "Educate a Child; Transform the World", encouraging us Presbyterians to support improving the quality of public education.

## DEACONS



She hates the idea of leaving PCOR but will keep in contact. Again, isn't the Fellowship group just plain outstanding.

A good portion of our deacons joined the church in late 2019 and early 2020 and didn't have time to know many people by sight before the shutdown. Food For Thought is a member of the California Food Is Medicine Coalition (CalFIMC), an association of community-based nonprofit organizations that provide healthy meals and support to individuals facing serious illness, including many clients who do not qualify for other free and lowcost meal services.
