Emerging Out from Under an Epidemic: So What Do We Do Now?

There is that old saying that Kelly Clarkson made into a hit song, *"What doesn't kill you makes you stronger."* It seems those of us who survived the Covid 19 pandemic are stronger in various ways. We are all winners of "Survivor." Thanks be to God!

My hope is that we would not only be stronger physically and psychologically but also spiritually focusing on all we have to be grateful for.

In June of 2019 none of us could have predicted how June of 2020 and now 2021 would look and feel so different due to the wearing of masks, the circles on the store sidewalks showing us where to stand, the fear of touching things without hand sanitizer and not getting closer than 6 feet to one another. Who could have predicted all of these things would become our new normal way of being?

Things are not yet back to normal, and many predict we will never be the same as before the pandemic. But maybe that is good? What do we appreciate more because it was taken away from us to help us survive? The lockdown helped us appreciate many things: in-person church worship services, being able to hug and pass the peace to our neighbors, smiling and having brief conversations at the grocery store without masks, playing with our children and grandkids, eating inside our favorite restaurants, and going to concerts and sports events.

Being thankful is always good. Maybe there is a way to be thankful the pandemic happened? The pandemic humbled us and helped all of humanity realize we are not infallible. Traveling had to stop for a while. And while it stopped Nature began to bounce back healthier, long enough for us to understand we can create a smaller carbon footprint on the planet. We learned to be more "mindful" of how we go about our public lives. The fellowship committee created "Joy" bags to bring joy to our congregation at home. The Deacons reached out to their buddies even more than usual. We prayed ancient prayers while we used new technology to worship God. We worked hard to keep our connection to God and to one another in new ways. **God gave us the resilience to survive. We are to use that gift to help others.**

So what do we do now? God's word still has the answer for how we proceed into 2021 as disciples of Christ Jesus:



PCOR Reopening Task Force

With June 15th on the horizon, the state is relaxing many of the COVID-19 restrictions to bring California back to a semblance of "normal".

Most of our congregation are vaccinated and contributes to the health and safety of your fellow Presbyterians.

For that, thank you for doing your part to help safely get us through this health crisis.

I was asked recently why we are not already in the sanctuary for worship. The sanctuary has a lower maximum capacity than Bowen Hall and would be more of a challenge to maintain social distancing going in and out of the pews. With the anticipated easing of restrictions on June 15, moving into the sanctuary will be the next step.

The plan is to resume worship in the sanctuary on Father's Day, June 20th. It remains unclear if masks will still be required for indoor gatherings.

Regardless of masks or no mask requirements, it will be up to everyone to determine what is appropriate to their comfort level for attending inside worship.

COVID-19 is still out there and most likely be around for some time. We must all remain vigilant with our own health and safety and pay attention to what developments come forth in living with this disease.

The Reopening Task Force will continue to learn more as it is revealed and keep you all advised.


ROSEBUD PRESCHOOL

LOIS STAIR: FIRST WOMAN GA MODERATOR

In 1971, after a close vote that went to three ballots, Ruling Elder Lois Harkrider Stair became the first woman elected as moderator of a Presbyterian General Assembly. The UPCUSA commissioners, 89 percent of whom were men, chose Stair to lead their denomination during a tumultuous year. The precedent-setting election drew national news coverage. As a former moderator of Milwaukee Presbytery and the Synod of Wisconsin, Lois Stair (1923-1981) was well-qualified to serve at the General Assembly level. But it was her gender that drew the most attention initially. Press reports described her as "vivacious" and "pretty," and one article even discussed the "special problems" faced by a woman moderator such as what to wear when traveling and how to keep her hair under control and her weight down. Stair discussed being the first woman moderator with good cheer, but she also addressed the tumultuous issues roiling the country and the UPCUSA. As moderator, she wanted to lead congregations away from their "cozy comfortableness" and toward diversity. She called for reorganizing church programs to emphasize such issues as equality and the

protection of minorities. "We must be able to face differences and be honest about them," she said at the conclusion of her term. As moderator, Stair modeled the bravery and confidence to listen, reflect, and speak forthrightly about Presbyterians following Christ during challenging times. 
VOYAGERS

This year's celebration was marked by receiving the Pentecost Offering which nurtures the faith of those who are the church to come — children, youth, and young adults.


Your Church & World Committee thanks you for your generous contributions to this important special offering which amounted to **\$635**.






Another month of Joy Bags being delivered and follow up calls by the Deacons. It never get old to hear how well the bags are received.


