PARENT NIGHT OUT IS CANCELED

Now that is a depressing quote by Ben Franklin isn't it? He also came up with the saying: "A penny saved is a penny earned!" And "Time is money." But this one about death and taxes is his most famous of all his "Franklin Proverbs."

According to the Constitution Daily, a blog from the National Constitution Center, the context of the quote is from a letter that Ben Franklin wrote to his friend, French scientist Jean-Baptiste Le Roy, "Our new Constitution is now established, everything seems to promise it will be durable; but, in this world, **nothing is certain except death and taxes,"....**

Then he concluded with a note about acceptance of his mortality: "My health continues much as it has been for some time, except that I grow thinner and weaker so that I cannot expect to hold out much longer."

We are more aware of our own mortality these days, too. The pandemic is stretching into its second year. We are losing more friends and loved ones to Covid 19. Our way of life is still altered in major ways. Life continues to feel uncertain. Underneath it all is a sense of loss of the way things used to be.

Accepting our losses will help us cope with the daily struggles in this era. Loss of jobs. Loss of friendships. Loss of freedom to travel. Loss of a sense of security in our health and financial future. The emotional toll of the loss of "normal life" affects our wellbeing.

How do we deal with chronic loss? We can learn from those who deal with chronic illnesses.

The following excerpt is from an article titled: <u>Grieving Your Losses</u> by Bruce Campbell (who provides therapy for people with chronic fatigue syndrome). These suggestions also help those grieving losses brought on by the pandemic.

STRATEGIES FOR MOVING THROUGH GRIEF

Illness brings loss, which takes some time to process. What can help you move through your time of grief?

First, recognize that you are grieving: Feel the emotions, the sadness. Try to understand what specific losses you are experiencing. Then pray and seek ways to make your daily living feel better.

Keep structure in your life: Having a routine provides a sense of stability and familiarity, counteracting the feelings of disorientation and uncertainty brought by loss. Writer Gail Cassidy suggests that routine also offers a distraction from loss. "Do not make any unnecessary major changes in your life during times of loss, as they can further add to the existing instability and anxiety."

Avoid stress: Having to adjust to the many changes brought by illness is traumatic. In a situation in which you are already overloaded emotionally, it's best to avoid people and situations that add more stress. Gail Cassidy suggests you "stay away from negative people and situations that trigger negative emotions."

Acknowledge loss: Some people report they found it useful to make a public declaration of loss. One person wrote a Christmas letter to friends to explain why they hadn't heard from him. The letter said, in part: "I am sobered by the realization that I will have to adjust to living a life with greater limits than before." He

reports writing the letter helped him accept his limits and, paradoxically, increased his resolve to improve.

Respond positively to self-pity: Almost everyone with chronic illness occasionally feels sorry for themselves. It is normal to have a brief "pity party." Here are five ideas for dealing with self-pity:

- Recognize self-pity is a part of serious illness: Just as symptoms wax and wane, so do emotions. Acknowledging that self-pity is happening can take some of its power away.
- Predict good coping. You might say something like: "I'm feeling sorry for myself." Then say something consoling like: "I've felt this way before and it's always blown over, so I trust it won't last this time either."
- Rest: Strong emotions are sometimes triggered by fatigue and other symptoms. In those instances, rest may help alleviate both physical symptoms and emotions.
- Connect with others: Reach out via phone, email or in-person contact. Sometimes just being in touch can change a mood.
- Help others: Shift your attention off yourself onto what you can do for your family, friends or others beyond your life.

Going to church and getting more involved in activities that are positive and helpful to others helps to overcome a sense of loss.

Join a church committee! Buildings and Grounds (Gary Smith), Membership (Kim Seamans), Fellowship (Deborah Baker), Adult Education (Linda Burille), the Children's ministry (Diane Osten), and the Church & World committee (Norm Smith) all need more members to expand the good work they are doing in the church and beyond.

Please consider joining a committee by calling the elder in charge to find out how you can help. These committees often become like a small support group for the members. We are here for each other in many ways and getting together to serve the church is a great way to deal with the losses inherent in life during a pandemic. Look for new ways to find the light in the darkness of loss. Trust God is near.

"Truly, it is in darkness that one finds the light, so when we are in sorrow, then this light is nearest of all to us." (Meister Eckhart)

Thanks to generous contributions from several members, most of the cost is being covered. Watch for the bright new look soon.

Session approved new members, Ellen Bowen and Leticia Outah by reaffirmation of faith and approved the baptism of Leticia Outah, Mia Outah and Elijah Outah on Sunday, 9-19-21.

PCOR REOPENING COMMITTEE NEWS

The COVID-19 virus and variants have provided information and situations that change daily.

The Reopening Task Force continues to meet weekly to assimilate the latest information and determine how to proceed for the health and safety of the congregation and groups that use our facility.

On August 24 the Session voted and adopted the following.

To mandate that all church employees be vaccinated for COVID-19, and if not vaccinated, to submit proof of COVID-19 PCR tests weekly.

To mandate that all volunteers involved with interpersonal interaction with children, youth, seniors or vulnerable populations shall be masked and vaccinated for COVID-19. If not vaccinated, the volunteers shall show proof of a negative PCR test administered within 72 hours prior to volunteer activity. Masking shall be in accordance with Sonoma County Public Health guidelines.

We are happy to report that our pastors, office staff, Children's Program Coordinator, and custodian are all vaccinated, as are all Montgomery High School breakfast volunteers and Sunday School volunteers.



FINANCE

No news is often good news! Well....nothing is going on in finance! We're through 7 months of our year and tracking very close to expected revenue which is lower than we'd like but it was anticipated and budgeted with the expectation that inperson worship would be slow to come back this year. We believe in-person worship drives unpledged revenue in that you make donations into the basket when at church for service but less so when you're not going to church. This we think explains why we are materially behind revenue expectation from unpledged giving.

You might remember the budget reflected a \$50,000+ loss for the year. But, baring a catastrophe, I'm reasonably confident that our annual results won't reach that primarily because we are holding down expenses. Example, total expenses through July 2020 \$204,336 total expenses through July 2021 \$164,142. Our loss through July stands at \$1,893 vs a budgeted expectation of \$28,684! Thank you expense control!!

ROSEBUD PRESCHOOL

We are three weeks into our fall session. We started the year with 5 four year old's, 14 three year old's, and 7 two year old's. We are figuring out the rhythms of this new group of kids. Later in the fall, we will add four additional two year old's bringing our total enrollment to 30 children - 24 a day. This allows us to keep a teacher child ratio of 1 to 6. This ratio is particularly important this year.

We are working with children many of whom did not have much social interaction beyond their families for the last year and a half.

We are also happy to announce that we have found a new director. Karen Arena will join the school on September 20th. She has been a director at a larger school in Rohnert Park and was looking to reduce her hours to spend more time with her two year old son. She liked what she saw at Rosebud and the School Board agreed that she will be a good fit with the Rosebud staff and program.

Susan will stay until the end of September to help with a smooth transition and will then be available afterwards for any questions that arise.

CHURCH & WORLD

According to UNICEF. A <u>magnitude 7.2</u> <u>earthquake struck southwestern Haiti</u> on Saturday morning, August 14, 2021. The quake was felt in the nation's capital, Port-au-Prince, but the epicenter was detected about 80 miles west near Saint-Louis-du-Sud.

Serious damage, injuries and casualties have been reported in the Grand'Anse, Sud and Nippes departments, affecting an estimated 1.2 million people, including 540,000 children. At least 1,900 have died and more than 9,900 were injured, according to Haiti's civil protection service. Many are still missing. More than 115,000 houses have been damaged or destroyed, along with public infrastructure, including hospitals, schools and bridges.

Your Church and World committee has set up a "Haiti EQ Relief Fund" to offer financial help to earthquake victims in Haiti. Session approved this action Aug 24th.

The moment for mission was highlighted in August by Pastor Cindy. We hope to raise \$1,000 so we can issue a check to Partners in Health, (<u>www.pih.org</u>). As the largest nongovernmental healthcare provider in Haiti, PIH

deploying staff and supplies, and providing trauma and emergency care. PIH was created and is run by Dr. Paul Farmer, author of the Pulitzer Prize winning book about <u>Haiti: Mountains Beyond</u> <u>Mountains.</u>




This class will be facilitated by Rev. Lynne Vandercook, Joanne Del Castillo, and






COMPUTER SAVVY? WE NEED VOLUNTEERS!
