

A little history, I am a Santa Rosa native and the proud granddaughter of Gilbert and Alice Gray who moved to Santa Rosa and one of the first Black families to settle here in Sonoma County from the South in the late 1940's. My grandfather was one of the first Black barbers working at Hamilton Airforce Base, while my grandmother was the first Black woman to work and hold a job of 10 years at Woolworths 5 & 10, store *No.614*, in

downtown Santa Rosa.

Thereafter, they also co-founded one of the first Black Churches in Santa Rosa, Community Baptist Church which still is around today.

I am a Civil Rights and Social Justice advocate and it's all because of my grandparents and their patriotic leadership within the Gray family "I am, because we are."

I have a heart for the people that I serve in our community and have been doing community outreach and engagement for over 20+ years and a grassroots youth program with a mantra "Each One, Reach One".

Growing up in a Southern Baptist Church I learned how to Praise & Worship in a way that God's presence illuminated and reflected through that as well as Praise & Worship dance, where just as David did in the Bible, I learned to allow the Spirit to flow and realized then that my purpose in life is God's purpose for me.

My life scripture since Vacation Bible School at the age of 10 has been Psalms 100:3 Know Ye that the Lord is God. ... It is he who hath made us, and not we ourselves; we are his people and the sheep of his pasture.

Some fun facts about me are, well for one I am an avid "Foodie" I love to try out new food of all kinds. I absolutely love Music and Poetry which move me. I used to sing and write music and now I just enjoy all that music encompasses, otherwise writing Poetry and performing it as a Spoken Word Poet is my passion. Lastly I love a good adventure so getting lost in the world is always a plus!

Some background on the Good Friday Concerts ...

The Good Friday Concert tradition has been offered at the Church of the Incarnation for the last 25 years, and from now on it's going to happen at Church of the Roses! The choral ensemble *Cantiamo Sonoma*, members of the *Roses Chancel Choir* and recruits from the community will also join in presenting Gabriel Fauré's exquisite Requiem with chamber orchestra and soloists.

I was introduced to the Good Friday tradition way back when I was 19 years old and traveled to San Francisco to audition for Alden Gilchrist, Director of Music at Calvary. On the evening of Good Friday, year after year, Calvary would present large choral works from Bach Cantatas to a variety of Requiems by Fauré, Cherubini, Michael Haydn, Durufle, and Brahms! Mozart's Grand Mass in C Minor and Bach's Mass in B Minor were also presented. I soon became involved in those productions as a soloist, and the Good Friday Concert series was so wonderful – the church was packed every year! Once a year the church was full of not only members of Calvary, but equally as many people from the community.

So I decided to bring the tradition up here to Sonoma County, and it has continued to fill the church with people. There is great power in the sung word, and for many people in our community it has become an important and spiritually fulfilling part of Holy Week.

Fauré Requiem (ed. Rutter)



The Fauré Requiem was first performed on January 16, 1888. The occasion was a funeral service at the Church of the Madeleine in Paris, where Fauré was choirmaster. The composer directed the modest-sized group of performers consisting of the Madeleine's choir of boys and men, accompanied by organ and an instrumental ensemble of harp, timpani, and violin with a handful of violas, cellos, and basses. The new Requiem (which was comprised of a personal selection of texts rather than the complete liturgical *Missa pro defunctis*) had only five movements, lacking numbers 2 and 6.

The subsequent history of the work is one of successive expansions: by 1893, Fauré had added two extra movements and augmented the accompaniment with horns; and in 1900, when the familiar published version appeared, it was re-scored for full orchestra. Recent researchers have cast doubt on whether Fauré himself prepared the 1900 version, which has many unsatisfactory features as well as distortions of the original music.

John Rutter edited the 1893 version of the Requiem from Fauré's manuscript, and this is the edition we will be presenting on Good Friday, April 15, 2022 at 7:30 p.m.

WORSHIP

Hopefully, by the time you read this, we will be meeting in person in the sanctuary, worshiping God together, raising our voices to the rafters. But staying safe and healthy is of the utmost importance, and we will worship together again when it is safe to do so. In the meantime, we Zoom.

As we look forward, March 2 is Ash Wednesday and March 6 the first Sunday in Lent. Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday April 10, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday are on the calendar before Easter is celebrated April 17.

Good Friday this year we are honored and blessed to offer the community a moving sacred concert production of **Fauré's Requiem**, conducted by Carol Menke with Cantiamo Sonoma and Chancel Choir. The cost of securing the orchestra accompaniment will cost PCOR \$3,000. If you love good music, please consider donating to the Good Friday Concert Fund. If you would like to see this become a new tradition at Roses, consider sponsoring this event. There are so many ways to reach out to our community, and music is one of them.



Proverbs 31:8-9 "Open your mouth for the mute, for the rights of all who are destitute. Open your mouth, judge righteously, defend the rights of the poor and needy."

PCOR recently applied for re-certification as an Earth Care Congregation. We have once again taken the PC(USA) Earth Care Pledge, thereby committing our church community to being a good steward of God's Earth. Our efforts can be seen



in worship, in outreach to the larger community of Santa Rosa, and in on-site facilities management.

Education and awareness are also factors when it comes to "making a difference."

Consider the dominant role of plastic in our lives, for example. Plastic was invented in 1907 by Leo Baekeland. His sole ambition, at that time, was to create a substance that could be used to insulate electrical wires.

Since Baekeland's breakthrough, plastic has become a central product in our world's consumer economy. Today factories and industries across the globe produce over 300 million tons of plastic each year, which is an amount nearly equal to the weight of all humans on the planet. About 79% of the plastic produced in the last century can be found in landfills, dumps, the ocean, and other natural environments.

Recycling is an answer, but only partially. Statistica.com estimates that in 2018 only 8.7% of the plastic used in the United States was recycled.

What else can we do? I asked my fifth grade students at Luther Burbank Elementary School to find out. They partnered up and went to work. Here's what they reported:

- Anderson and Jesus wrote, "Restaurants and cafes always use plastic straws. Paper straws are better. Tell the manager."
- Axel wrote, "Don't buy cheap toys, especially if they only cost a dollar. They break the very next day, mostly the trains."
- Tonatiuh wrote, "Ziplock bags can be washed. My mom turns them inside out and keeps them in a canister next to the sink."
- Emily wrote, "Some countries use the stem of a papaya plant as straws. It's very stylish."
- Isabella, Julieta and Jasmine wrote, "Plastic just breaks down into smaller and smaller pieces. The oceans are in danger. Turtles eat the chemicals that make plastic."

In 2022, PCOR will be in its fourth year as an Earth Care Congregation. As for me, I find it inspiring to see the Earth Care Logo adorning PCOR newsletters, correspondence and facilities. The message is clear. We are a caring, attentive community. We are responsive to the needs of our Earth, as well as to the needs of the children and grandchildren who will follow us. Thank you, PCOR.

DEACONS

As our year came to a close the Deacons of PCOR had a lot to be Thankful for. Thanks-be-to God for all who donated the 2 huge barrels of food for the Redwood Empire Food bank, (we will continue our monthly in-person volunteering this year as Covid allows).

We also delivered some lovely plants donated by Pastor Cindy to our home bound members at Christmas time. The Deacons along with Pastor Cindy contacted the new management of Montgomery Village and received a donation of 50 - \$15.00 gift certificates for the students in the Montgomery High Breakfast Program. Pastor Cindy passed out 35 to the students and the remaining 15 were delivered to the Boys and Girls Club with an additional \$100 Lucky Store gift card. The Giving Tree was a huge success - 70 hearts were selected and gifts purchased. That number exceeded our previous year and hopefully even more this year. Our gifts were much appreciated.

We bid adieu with grateful hearts to those Deacons that have moved on to other service, a very special thanks goes out to Bill Nakata/team for all their research on procuring/setting up our new congregational coffee pot. We have 3 new Deacons, Ellen Bowen, Suzanne Hanson, and Kristina Teixeira. Some of you will be meeting your new Deacon soon.


The donation levels for flowers are \$45 or \$55 per donation. Sign up for flower offerings on the Flower Calendar posted in Campbell Ct.



WHAT IS THE PER CAPITA APPORTIONMENT?

Please donate the per capita to the church for every family member you have in the Church of the Roses membership. **Each apportionment is** \$34.00 for the year 2022.

Each year the Presbyterian Church (USA) establishes a per capita apportionment. When we pay our per capita, we are helping to support the structures that support us as a congregation: the Presbytery, the Synod, and the General Assembly. These councils of the church consult with our elders and pastor/s on all aspects of church life, bring us together with other congregations to grow in faith and do mission, sponsor projects to show Jesus' love all over the world, and help us manage our programs, finances, and buildings. In 2022, each congregation in Redwoods Presbytery will receive a bill charging \$34.00 for each active member. Of that amount, \$8.98 goes to the General Assembly, \$5.22 to the Synod of the Pacific, and \$19.80 to the Presbytery of the Redwoods.

If you are able, please prayerfully consider paying this per capita apportionment in addition to your regular giving. It will help with our church budget!



10:30 am at Headlands lot


